New York, May 5 .- With more than two weeks of the major league pennant races completed, the great Rogers Hornsby, who won the batting championship of the National League last season for the fourth consecutive year, is again leading the batsmen of his circuit. His mark for the first fifteen games of the year is . 426. He has made 26 hits in 64 times at bat. Zack Wheat of the Robins is second with .413. Grantham of the Cubs ranks third among the regulars, with .375. Grimes, also of the Cubs, is fourth with .373, and Fournier of the Robins is fifth with . 354.

> Romero will enter the ring an unknown quantity. His only claim to recognition is a career in which he has vanquished a number of ordinary rivals. The fact that Luis Angel Firpo declined to meet the Chilean in a bout in the Argentine is one of the principal reasons for Promoter Tex Rickard's bringing Romero to this country. Romero, after several conquests in European rings, returned to his native Argentine and hurled challenges at Firpo, which the latter ignored until after Romero had consented to come to this country. Then Firpo, according to the information reaching Rickard, decided to recognize Romero's challenges, but the Chilean elected to ignore Firpo and visited America. Firpo recently requested that Rickard postpone Romero's bout against Johnson, and expressed a desire to oppose Romero in the latter's first American bout as a condition of Firpo's return to this country, but this proposal was rejected by Rickard.

Passenger Johnson, who has been enjoying a needed rest since his knockout at the hands of Jack Refault, is expected to give Romero a thorough trial. The Iowan is a rugged, aggressive fighter whose willingness to carry the fight with persistency overshadows his weakness in boxing skill and effectiveness. If Romero defeats Johnson in decisive manner the Chilean next will be pitted against Renault in a bout to be held within four weeks, according to present plans. A victory over Renault, in

CARPENTIER IN PARIS.

Preparing to Leave Shortly for United States.

Paris, May 5 .- Georges C. Carpenier, who knocked out Arthur Townley of England in Vienna on May Day, returned to Paris, yesterday preparatory to leaving for the United States for his meeting with Tommy Gibbons at Michigan City, Ind. Carpentier, Francois Descamps, his manager, and their party, had not yet decided whether to take passage on the liner Majestic from Cherbourg, May 7th, or on the France from Havre next Saturday.

Speaking on his fight in Vienna, Carpentier said he found Townley strong and dangerous throughout the first round until the Frenchman reached his opponent's chin just before the bell. He declared his final knockout blow was an eminently fair one, pointing for confirmation of this to the moving picture film.
