There are many workers who will grab a similar increase and be thankful."

On behalf of the Kingston branch of Federated Postal Workers, I shall consider it a favor if you allow me space to make a few comments on that article, which no doubt will prove misleading to your readers. Any increase in salary, for postal workers, which the government offers, is to replace the cost of living bonus and if, as stated, we are to receive fifteen per cent., it is not to be over and above present salary and bonus combined, and would only benefit workers without dependents. Workers with dependents would receive cuts ranging from \$36 to \$200 per annum under this revision.




