C. FOLGER GIVEN KEY BY SIR ADAM BECK

Opening of New Offices of the Public Utilities Commission on Friday.

With the handing over of the key to Manager C. C. Folger, by Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission, on Friday afternoon, the new offices of the public utilities commission, on Queen street, were declared officially opened. The ceremony was witnessed by quite a large number of prominent citizens, the attendance being exceptionally good, in view of the inclement weather. R. N. F. McFarlane, chairman of the utilities commission, presided, and introduced Sir Adam Beck who gave an address, at the close of which he handed over the key to Manager Folger and the latter made a most fitting reply. Sir Adam made an inspection of the new building and was greatly pleased with the offices and their equipment. The building was thrown open to the public between 4 and 5 o'clock on Friday afternoon, and quite a large number of citizens availed themselves of the opportunity to make an inspection.

Chairman McFarlane Speaks.
"Notwithstanding the criticism which I feel has been unjustly levelled at the local commission, it is indeed a pleasure for me to-day, on behalf of my fellow commissioners, to welcome you to this beautiful and spacious office, which we consider a credit and a valuable asset to the City of Kingston," said Chairman R. N. F. McFarlane, in opening his address.

"When the question of consolidation was approached, there were some who felt that the offices should have been moved to the City Buildings. This was impossible, because in the entire quarters of the Bank of British North America, which we were requested to occupy, there was not in their whole building, nearly the floor space that there is on this ground floor alone. Hence, to occupy this portion of the city office was impossible.

"The question of expenditure has been raised, and on this point, let me say most emphatically, that this entire transaction not only carries, but in a short time will pay for itself. The maintenance and up-keep of the two offices naturally increased our operating costs, and in this division alone, I point to the fact, with particular interest, when I say most definitely that by this amalgamation, we can from now on, effect a saving of \$1,500 per annum in office wages alone.

"As a municipal enterprise and as servants of the public, we realize that service in every department is most essential. Only by the united aid and co-operation of best individual effort can ultimate success ever be attained. We, as commissioners, after careful investigation, erected these offices with that thought in mind—to consolidate our entire working staff, executive, accounting, operation and distribution, so that all information is available under the one roof.

"The commission has put forth its best efforts to furnish the citizens with an efficient up-to-the-minute service, made possible by the completion of the new office which is greatly honored to-day by the presence of Sir Adam Beck, the most outstanding man in the hydro development in the world to-day—one, who by his untiring energy, vision and strong personality, has placed the province of Ontario in the enviable position which it holds to-day, as a power producing country, equalled by few and excelled by none."

Sir Adam Beck's Address.
In his opening remarks, Sir Adam Beck stated that he considered it a great honor to be invited to come to Kingston. "It is the most important city we have business dealings with in connection with the hydro electric power project between Toronto and Cornwall," he added. "I am glad to be able to be present at the opening of this building, which must be a source of great pride to you. If there is one thing that public ownership has done, it is to stimulate public pride and efficiency in the various communities where these enterprises are located."

Sir Adam remarked that it was now eight years since he had first had the honor of taking up the question of electrical power with the authorities in Kingston and here the speaker remarked that in all cases in which he was engaged in spreading propaganda for electrical supply, it had to undertake more or less of a controversial character. The question was raised as to the ability of the organization to cope with the enterprise and the ability of the organization to make predictions with the assurance that they would materialize in time. The commission had been thoroughly investigated. The speaker referred to the Gregory report. The commission had been justified in the expenditure of large sums of money. Everything in connection with the work of the commission had been laid bare and not one charge of wrong doing had been attached to any member of the association.

Sir Adam stated that the present occasion was one for congratulation. Citizens should be proud that the commissioners had been able to erect such a fine building to carry on a business that represented an investment of a million dollars. Hydro alone represented a half million.

Not Extravagant.
The offices were consolidated in the interests of economy, and the speaker did not regard the expenditure as extravagant when compared

with other buildings he had had the honor of opening. The building was an airy one, well lighted, and conveniently arranged.

The speaker pointed out that the local plant had been signed up with the hydro commission as a customer rather than a co-partner. The commission was giving power under a contract price the best that could be given and the best possible service. Figures were given to show the saving in rates and the end was not yet. In the near future there was hope of other municipalities becoming co-partners and a further reduction. With the development of more power, there would be no reduction of power up to the full capacity in this district. The speaker had hopes that this city would become a co-partner.

Sir Adam congratulated Kingston on its ability to finance their utilities and said the people had reason to offer their gratitude to those who had administered the work. And it was not always a matter of joy or pleasure to serve the public. The speaker had faith in the people of Canada and especially the people in this district.

At the close of his address, Sir Adam handed the key to Manager Folger and after a brief reply by Mr. Folger, the ceremonies were brought to a close.

Mr. Folger stated that he would do his best to justify the confidence placed in him and could assure the citizens that he would put forth his best efforts to give the people the best possible service.

Mayor Wilson, of Gananoque, attended the opening of the new offices with a party of prominent residents of that place and also attended the meeting in the evening addressed by Sir Adam Beck.

BANQUET TO SIR ADAM.

At the Frontenac Hotel Was a Splendid Event.

The dinner at the Hotel Frontenac on Friday evening tendered to Sir Adam Beck, was a splendid affair. Some one hundred sat down. The guests were largely composed of the members of the Utilities Commission, Board of Trade, city council, board of education and similar bodies, including the officials of each. The mayors of Picton and Gananoque were also present. A fine orchestra and a Scotch vocalist, Mr. Marshall, gave acceptable service. The menu, provided by Marie Host Hughes, was of the richest character. It was the general opinion that a finer spread had not been provided in years, and demonstrated that the hotel was capable of the highest of service. The toast to "The King" was the only one offered. The whole event was a feast of delight.

On his arrival in the city on Friday afternoon, Sir Adam Beck was met by Mayor Angrove and the members of the Public Utilities Commission and taken to the Utilities building, where he made a thorough inspection and expressed himself as being well pleased with the building and its equipment.

Following the inspection of the building, Sir Adam was taken to the Royal Military College, where he made an inspection. General Sir Archibald Macdonnell had tea served in honor of the distinguished visitor.
