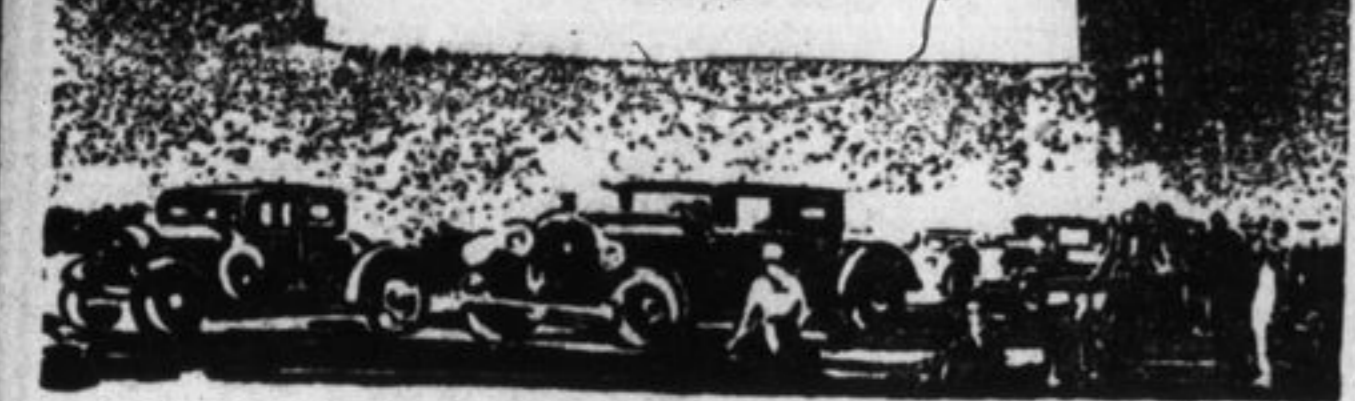

PORTSMOUTH COUNCIL

Will Pass By-law for Opening of Johnson Street.
At a special meeting of the Portsmouth council held on Monday evening it was decided to pass a by-law for the opening up of what will be the continuation of Johnson street, through to the forty-foot road. The by-law is now being prepared and will be passed at the next meeting of the council.

The council will ask Warden Penford to make some necessary repairs on Union street, bordering on penitentiary property.

Street Paving Operations.
The paving operations of the Board of Works on King and Queen streets are progressing very favorably. The concrete mixer is already on the job and is rapidly spreading the foundation for Ontario and Bagot is all graded and the concrete curbs are laid.

A large gang is busy on King street levelling and grading. The car tracks have been laid from Princess to Queen street. When the mixer has reached King it will move to Princess and lay the concrete along the tracks in a day it is hoped. Then the work will be carried up Queen to Montreal street.

Signallers' Camp.
No. 3 Signalling Company, 3rd. Battalion C. of S., will go into camp at Barridfield for one week commencing July 1st next, with Major W. Allan Stroud in command. The detachment will consist of sections from Napanee, Peterboro, Belleville and a special cable and wireless section from Kingston. Previous to the camp there will be a special three-day course at local headquarters.

Burial of George Jackson.
The funeral of the late George Jackson was held Wednesday morning from the residence of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John H. Jackson, 441 Alfred street, Rev. J. S. LaFlair, of the First Baptist church, conducted the last services. The parents have the sympathy of the entire community over the tragic death of their little son.

Died Suddenly in Buffalo.
The police on Wednesday morning received a telegram from Buffalo, N.Y., stating that a man named John Poland, supposed to be from Kingston, had died suddenly in that city, and asking that an effort be made to locate relatives in this city. No person of that name could be located and it is believed that a mistake was made in the name. The police are asking for more information.

Warren Y. Soper, Ottawa, died at midnight. He was a director of the Canadian Locomotive Co.

EX-TORONTO MAYOR THE MAN APPROACHED

By F. H. Richardson Regarding Influencing the City's Bank Deposits.

Toronto, May 14.—Frederick H. Richardson related yesterday afternoon before Official Referee Charles Garrow, K.C., at Osgoode Hall, the history of special commissions, totalling \$13,500, made to him by the Home Bank between March 29th, 1921, and July 7th, 1923, to influence city deposits in the bank.

In brief Mr. Richardson's evidence was that, consequent upon a request made in 1920, by Colonel J. Cooper Mason, general manager of the Home Bank, he agreed to exert his influences with a view to obtaining a greater share of the city of Toronto's deposits for the Home Bank than had hitherto been the case. For his services, if successful, he was to receive a monthly commission of 1 per cent. upon the average monthly deposit to the credit of the City of Toronto.

In fulfillment of this agreement, he paid a number of visits to the City Hall in the late summer of 1920 and the early part of 1921, where in each case, he says, he interviewed Controller Alfred Maguire, urging that a bank with headquarters in the city should receive better treatment in the matter of deposits, and suggesting that the city's business should be divided more equally among the banks. In each instance, Mr. Richardson stated, Controller Maguire promised to advise such an adjustment.

Mr. Richardson stated that his recollection now was that "in some way Controller Maguire told me that he had advised the Finance Department that the city's business should be divided more equally among the banks," but he could not remember the exact words used by Mr. Maguire.

OLD AGREEMENT RENEWED.

Between Machinists and Management at Locomotive Works.

Mr. Harry Kirwin, of Birch Cliff, Ont., representing the International Association of Machinists, has been in the city a couple of days and announced to the Whig on Wednesday that the old agreement between the machinists and the management of the locomotive works had been renewed and would be signed forthwith. Mr. Kirwin addressed a mass meeting of the machinists Tuesday night and met the management of the company on Wednesday forenoon. The agreement stands the same for 1924-5.

Mr. Kirwin stated that the relations between the unions and the company were of a very friendly nature, and that both sides had agreed to continue under the old agreement.

RECOMPENSING DEPOSITORS.

Of Home Bank Would Not Appeal to Government.

Ottawa, May 14.—"I do not think that the policy of recompensing the depositors and taking over the wreck of the bank would appeal to the Government," said Commissioner H. A. McKeown this morning, during the Home Bank inquiry.

Hon. T. A. Crerar, a former director of the bank, was recalled to stand for a few minutes, and Sir Thomas White gave evidence in regard to the payment of \$1,500 to him by the bank shortly before it failed.

Australia and the Navy.
One of the difficulties of democracy is that too frequently it goes to sleep, and is forgetful of its obligations, the first of which is the adoption of all requisite measures for the national defence. It is not a charge to which Australia is specially liable; indeed, it is proper to remember that in the way of naval defence the Commonwealth has done more than all the rest of the Dominions put together. Yet, though their security depends upon it, it is open to question whether naval defence is as much in the thoughts of Australians as it ought to be. With a long coastline, and so many of their cities and towns bordering on the sea, Australians should be born sailors; yet the Australian navy has been going backward, owing to the scarcity of recruits. . . . When all is said, and allowance made for the creditable fact that, though not the oldest of the Dominions, Australia has "by far the biggest navy," it must be owned that the "sea sense" is not as highly developed as it should be—Adelaide Chronicle.

ONTARIO POLICE CHANGES.

Deputy Controller May Join C.P.R. Establishment.

Toronto, May 14.—Rumors of changes in the Ontario provincial police department took fairly definite shape today, when it became known that Deputy Controller Alfred Cuddy had an offer from the C. P. R. to take charge of the railway's detective and police establishment with headquarters in Montreal. It is understood that Chief Chamberlain had recommended Mr. Cuddy as his successor.

"Interviewed today," says a Toronto paper, "Mr. Cuddy would not admit that he is making a shift, but he was later learned that he has promised to arrive at a decision with respect to the offer by the end of June. The C.P.R. appointment entails a salary of \$10,000 a year.

Coupled with the rumor of Mr. Cuddy's prospective departure from the provincial service, is the story that Deputy Chief Goddes, of the Toronto police force, may succeed him in Queen's Park.

A story is also printed that there is lack of harmony between Commissioner V. A. S. Williams and the various ministers, and that there is a possibility of the commissioner resigning.

SAYS FINDER IS KEEPER.

Bergdoll Buried \$270,000 in Gold in United States.
Eberbach, Baden, May 14.—"Finder-keepers," says Grover Bergdoll, the United States draft dodger, with reference to the gold he buried in 1917, when his game of hide and seek with the United States authorities began. All told, says Bergdoll, who has made his home here for the last four years, there were exactly \$270,000 in nice-shiny ten dollar gold pieces. Bergdoll declares the gold is buried in the United States, but that is about all he will say about it.

"If I should die," he remarked recently, "the gold will never be found. That's how securely it's hidden. No one was with me when I put it away, and no one will ever find it until I go for it myself."

CRADLE BESIDE FLAG.

Bishop of Exeter Would Have Girls Salute Former.
London, May 14.—"If I had my way, I would put a cradle beside the flag on Empire Day, and when the girls of the schools came to salute the flag, I would make every girl salute the cradle," declared Lord William Gascoyne-Cecil, Bishop of Exeter, a cousin of Lord Balfour, in a speech yesterday.

"What has happened in France in the matter of the falling birth rate," the bishop continued, "is also happening here. The average family in Devonshire is only slightly over three members."

Permits to Buy Liquor.
Calgary, Alta., May 14.—More than 1,200 permits to purchase liquor under the Alberta Liquor Control Act, proclaimed Saturday, were issued here yesterday on the first day of sale and on the first day of legal sale for nearly eight years.

Fatal Fall From Railway Coach.
Renfrew, May 14.—James Steel, on his way from Saskatchewan to Glasgow, Scotland, was killed when he fell out of the open door of a railway coach as the train was taking a sharp curve at Payne, near here.
