The Grass Is Excellent—Boys Are Causing Annoyance. The rugby season is far away, but preparations are none the less under way at the Queen's stadium. The grass presents one of the biggest problems, but Mr. Hyland is glad to report that the growth this spring is a month ahead of last year's. There has been considerable seeding done and it has taken an excellent hold. The new bleachers erected last fall are being given a coat of slate paint. The authorities are much troubled with boys who either climb over the walls or break in the doors, and make free with the property inside. A heavy inch pipe used in watering the grass has been bent nearly at right angles. The youngsters also climb over the steelwork of the roof, even out over the track, where a fall would most likely be fatal. The boys have been threatened, and a sharp watch is being kept on them.

IN MARINE CIRCLES

The steamer City of Hamilton passed east during Thursday night. The steamer Cataract was expected from western points to-day. The steamer Mapleheath arrived and cleared east. The government tug Concretia is at the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company's wharf, and will go into drydock for minor repairs. The steamer Kingston was floated at the C.S.B. Co.'s drydock this morning and clears this evening for Toronto where she will shortly resume her regular run. The news of the death of the late Andrew Maclean spread quickly along the waterfront this morning. He was well known by marine men.

Eggs at 7 Cents a Dozen. A young student who is spending the summer at a point in southern Saskatchewan writes, informing us that eggs in his district are seven cents a dozen and hard to get rid of, and that good cream may be purchased at about sixty cents a gallon. Seeding Very Late. The frequent rains of late are keeping the farmers behind in getting in their seed. Whereas in other years it was possible to have seeding finished in April, a Wolfe Island farmer said on Friday that he had twenty-five acres still untouched.
