CUSTOMS HOLDS SALE OF UNCLAIMED GOODS

A Large Crowd Attended—Bidders Were Shown the Goods Before Purchasing.

The sale of unclaimed goods held at the customs examining warehouse on Clarence street Thursday morning attracted a large crowd, and the bidding was keen and fast. Many valuable articles were offered for sale and the bidders were shown the goods before purchasing, which brought much better prices. The variety of goods was exceedingly interesting, and the sensation was that which one has at a "fish pond" at some country fair or festival. It was hard to say what would come forth next.

The heaviest buyer of the day was "Dad" Fraser, who purchased just about everything in sight and accumulated a lot of valuable merchandise. A magnificent Savage repeating rifle brought \$29; a crankshaft sold for 30c.; a tire, with tube and rim, brought \$17; a gallon of "acid" sold for 25c.; the complete outfit for installing an electric bell brought \$2.50; a wonderful cross of finely worked and polished marble, in three pieces, with fastenings, something that would have cost twenty times the price by order, was sold for \$1.25; a lot of sugar-coated dates sold at the rate of 35c. for a half dozen packages. The list of goods sold is too numerous to relate, but it was certainly interesting. A box of groceries was put up for sale. A bidder offered \$1.75 and then did not claim his bargain, so Auctioneer William Murray calmly purchased it himself at the same price and was well satisfied.

People from all walks of life and lines of business dropped in and purchased articles which took their fancy, or stood and watched the fun while two keen bidders were at work.

BIOLOGICAL STATUS.

Two New Ones at Halifax and Prince Rupert.

The biological Board of Canada, which met in Ottawa on Monday under the chairmanship of Dr. A. F. Knight, of this city, is, at the request of the government, making immediate arrangements for the opening of two new stations, one at Halifax and one at Prince Rupert. The site at Halifax has already been chosen on the King's Wharf, where an unoccupied building belonging to the militia will be fitted up ready for operations about the middle of June.

The new stations will differ from the present two stations in important respects. Whereas the old ones permit investigation by the student workers of purely scientific subjects the new posts will be wholly practical. Men appointed to the new ones will have to study at first hand all the existing methods of curing fish, return then to the biological laboratories where they will seek better processes of curing, salting and drying fish. They will then have to teach these new methods to the fishermen on the coast. The new stations will involve the appointment of two honor graduates in biology,

with special knowledge of bacteriology and bio-chemistry.

Arrangements were also made for the board's present two stations at St. Andrew's on the Atlantic and Nanaimo on the Pacific, with the appointment of officers. Last year there were 38 workers, 4 science graduates, the others being students doing post-graduate work and receiving nothing from the board outside of travelling expenses, board and lodging. The stations will be open from June 1st to September 30th.

SEWER ON BARRACK STREET.

Board of Works to Recommend That It Be Constructed.

At a meeting of the Board of Works held on Wednesday afternoon, a petition was received from J. P. Forrest, Samuel Crawford and others, asking for a sewer on Barrack street, between Wellington and King street.

City Engineer Dick reported favorably in the matter and on motion of Ald. Kidd, it was decided to recommend to council that the sewer be constructed under local improvement and under the supervision of the city engineer.

On motion of Ald. Joyce, the E. L. Ruddy Company was given permission to transfer their sign board now located at 285 Division street, to a point south of 493 Division street.

The request of J. Page, to construct a portico on his house on Sydenham street was granted.

The Bell Telephone Company wrote the board stating that the company in an endeavor to improve the service desired permission to install anchors, cables and poles on a number of the city streets.

The city engineer will meet a representative of the company and ascertain what the company proposes to do and report back to the board.

The board will take action on a number of suggestions offered by the Kingston Automobile Club at a recent meeting. Montreal street will be spaced off with white paint for the parking of cars and the street intersections will also be marked off.

The chairman, Ald. Peters, presided at the meeting and the other members present were Aids. Joyce, Kidd, Sargent and Johnston.

AT BETHEL CHURCH.

Address By Rev. George A. MacKenzie, Wednesday Evening.

Rev. George A. MacKenzie, Stratford, gave another address in Bethel church on Wednesday evening, in connection with the anniversary services, his subject being "The Tale of Two Cities" as mentioned in the Book of Revelations.

"One of these cities," said Mr. MacKenzie, is for purging and restoration, and the other is for destruction. We get a picture of Jerusalem, Palestine, in the last of this age, in the 11th chapter of Revelations. The Gentiles shall desecrate the temple, of the holy city. Armies of all nations shall attack it by land and in the air, by their navies through the Mediterranean Sea, but it shall withstand it all for it is a city of purging and restoration.

The second city mentioned is the Gentile city of Babylon, which is the city of destruction. Here will be the greatest commercial centre of the world. But its inhabitants shall murmur and weep for its destruction. This prophecy has never yet been fulfilled. There must be a reassembling of the eastern and western peoples before that is fulfilled.

Mr. MacKenzie will give his final address on Thursday evening taking as his subject "New Testament Teachings About Worship and Consecration."

WHY THE WEATHER?

Computing the Winds Aloft.

With all the variety of the weather, it is remarkable how closely the temperatures, pressures, and winds aloft correspond at one time with those of another when the surface conditions are similar. Dr. C. L. Meisinger of the Weather Bureau has found that if one knows the pressure, wind direction and air temperature at the surface he can compute rather closely the temperatures and pressures at various heights up to a few miles, and by comparing computed pressures at the same levels over different stations he can determine the approximate wind direction and velocity. The methods were worked out from several years of daily observations obtained by the Weather Bureau with kites at seven stations. The results were then applied generally through the eastern half of the United States.

When the wind at the ground is from a certain direction, these observations show that the temperatures up to modern heights differ from that at the ground usually by a certain amount which varies with the season and the location. Since the density of the air depends largely on the pressure and the temperature the pressure at any moderate height can readily be found by subtracting from that at the surface the weight of an air column of a density called for by the temperature of the air column and the pressure at the ground. When pressures over a number of places have been computed it is possible to find the direction and steepness of the pressure change and so to compute the direction and velocity of the wind aloft.

When such maps pass the experimental stage further improvements in forecasting winds for aviators and in forecasting storm tracks when upper air observations are prevented by low clouds or storm winds may be expected.
