Date Nut Broad (An excellent recipe for a different and wholesome bread)

3 cupfuls flour 1 cupful milk 1 cupful sugar 5 teaspoonfuls baking powder 1 cupful chopped nuts
1 teaspoonful salt
2 tablespoonfuls Crisco
1/2 cupful dates

Cream sugar and Crisco, add egg and part of milk. Add dry in-gredients alternately with milk. Add floured nuts and dates last. Bake 1 hour in slow oven. This mixture may rise 20 minutes before baking.

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
