"The Queen's Birthday"

"The twenty-fourth of May is the Queen's birthday. If we don't get a holiday, we'll all run away."

So we chanted when the world was a quarter of a century younger and England's greatest queen sat on the throne in the heart of the empire. For days of delightful anticipation of the joys of "the 24th" the air was pre-ved with the smell of gunpowder from the fire crackers, re-peatedly set off by the boys of the family whose patience was not equal to the strain of waiting until the morning of the great day, which when at length it arrived, was ushered in by a royal salute of twenty-one guns made by a reckless expenditure of fire crackers. Flags were hung out by the more enthusiastic before the break of day so that all honor should be done to her for whom we prayed Sunday by Sunday as "Our Sovereign Lady, Queen Victoria." Country and city alike observed the day with whole hearted loyalty.

From the surrounding farms and villages families packed into dem-ocrates drawn by horses (often a bit weary with the spring seeding) came to Kingston to see the sights and join the towns people at Barriefield common where a sham fight and military review was held. Picnics, the first of the season, were planned weeks ahead and if capricious May was in a favorable mood, merry parties found their way by row boats, canoes, yachts or vans to Kingston Mills, Cedar Island or the lake shore to wander through the woods gathering trilliums, blue phlox, violets and the red columbine clinging to the rocky ledges. The white bil-berry and choke cherry shook their snowy blossoms then as now and filled the air with their fragrance. No motors were on hand to carry parties miles away, but the days were just as happy for all that and the girls who wore their hair in a pig-tail tied with ribbon, whose faces

Date Nut Bread

(An excellent recipe for a different and wholesome bread)

3 cupfuls flour
1 cupful milk
1 cupful sugar
5 teaspoonfuls baking powder
1 egg
1 cupful chopped nuts
1 teaspoonful salt
2 tablespoonfuls Crisco
1/2 cupful dates

Cream sugar and Crisco, add egg and part of milk. Add dry ingredients alternately with milk. Add flour and nuts and dates last. Bake 1 hour in slow oven. This mixture may rise 20 minutes before baking.

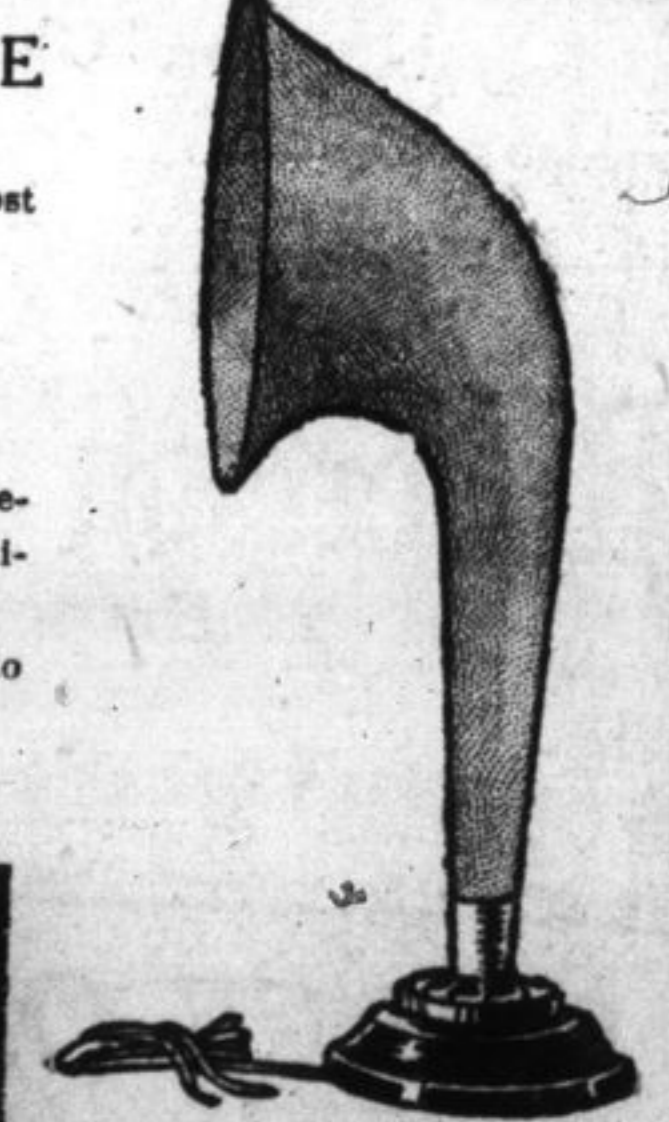
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
