BOARD OF HEALTH.

Reports Received From Milk And Sanitary Inspectors.

A meeting of the Board of Health was held on Tuesday afternoon, but the business was of a routine nature. Reports were presented by the milk inspector, Dr. G. W. Bell and the sanitary inspector, Eugene Sleeth, showing that both officers

had been active in their work. The sanitary officer reported that since the last meeting, he had placarded fifteen dwellings, two for diphtheria, two for measles and ten for scarlet fever, while he had also placarded a house which had been found to be unfit for human habi-

In his report Dr. Bell showed that he had examined 168 cows and made 31 dirt tests. Ten cows had been condemned. Fifty-one had been tested for tuberculosis and two had been found suspicious and taken out. Some minor complaints were dealt with satisfactorily.
