LITERARY PRIZES.

Are Announced By the Daughters of the Empire.

Toronto, May 30.—Announcement has just been made of the winners in the 1924 literary competition sponsored by the Daughters of the Empire. For several years, as an encouragement to young Canadian writers and playwrights, the society has offered two cash prizes for literary efforts. For the best short story \$200 is offered, and for the best one-act play \$100.

The best short story was written by Mr. John Pease Babcock, of Victoria, B.C., entitled "Peace River Joe." The best play, carrying with it the \$100 prize, was written by T. M. Morrow, of Westmount, Que., entitled, "Coincidence."

The judges of the short stories were Prof. Sandwell of Queen's University, Duncan Campbell Scott, of Montreal, and Miss J. P. Sims of Montreal.

Judges of the plays were Bertram Forsyth, Fred Jacob and Henry Button, all of Toronto.

Word has been received of the death at Ocean Grove, N.J., on May 26th, of Mrs. Samuel Heck, a native of Brockville. She celebrated her eightieth birthday on May 22nd and is survived by one daughter, Miss Nellie Heck, New York.

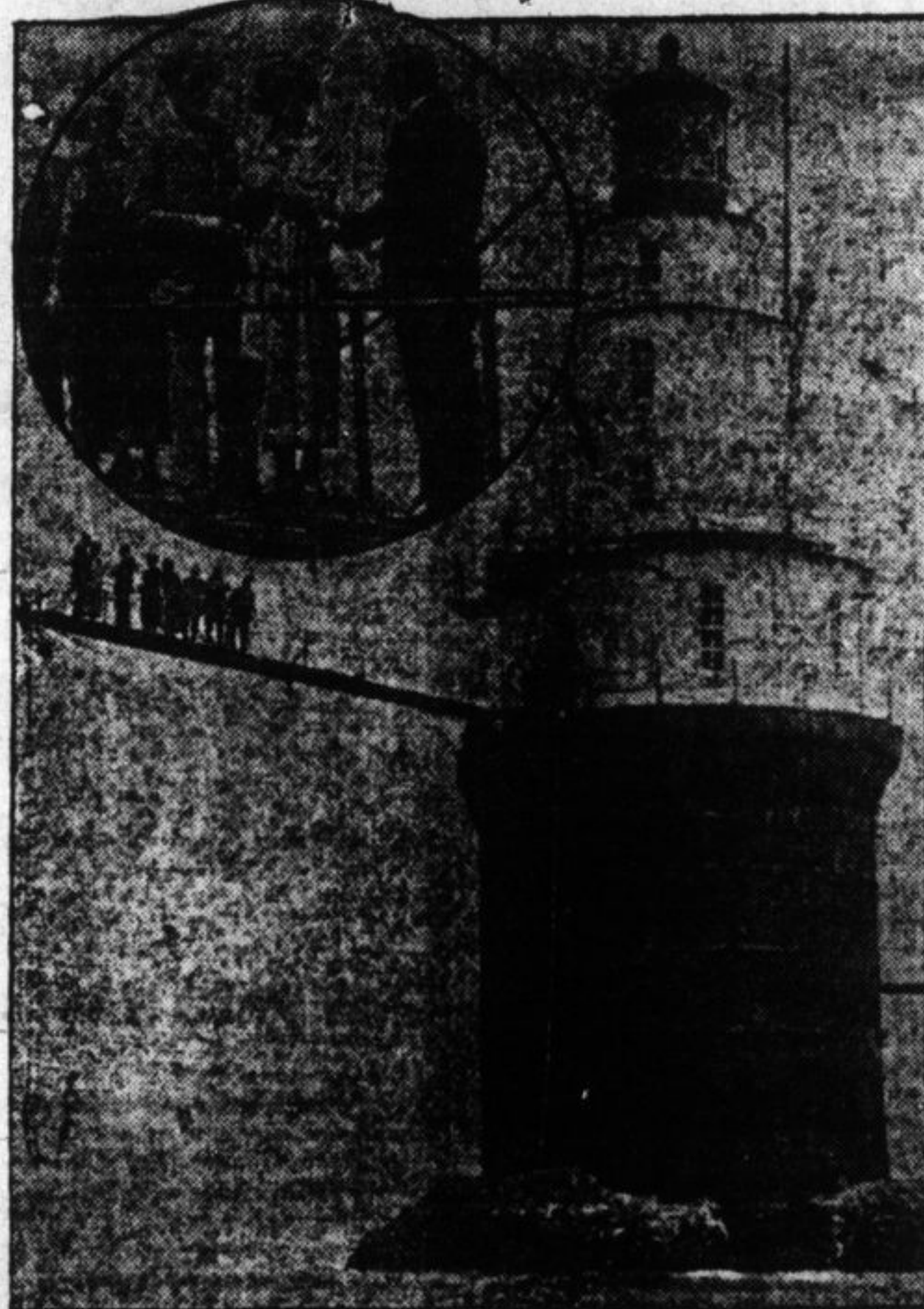

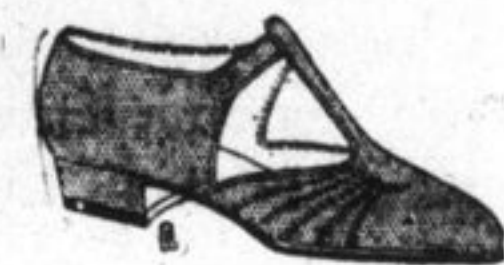

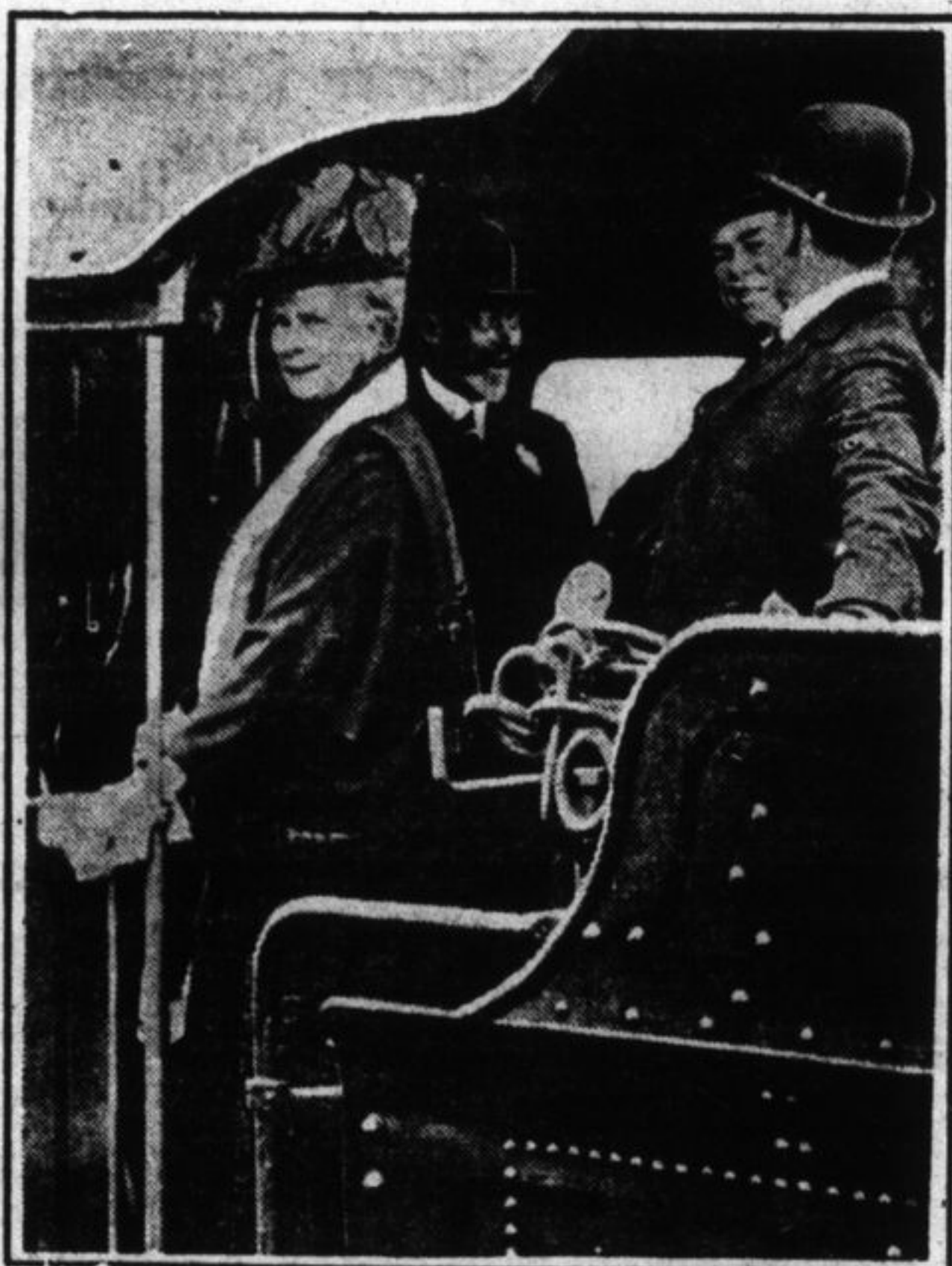
