P.W.O.R. INSPECTION ON BARRIEFIELD AREA

"C" Company, Commanded by Capt. d'Esterre, Won the Battalion Shield.

The annual inspection of the P.W.O.R. by Brig-Gen. Eimsley on the Barriefield area Friday night was considered one of the best that the regiment has had.

The battalion left the Armouries at 7.45 o'clock sharp and at No. 1 Area, Barriefield, received the General at 8.15. The attack as outlined in the Whig on Thursday night was then carried out.

On their return to the armouries, Major George Bowden was presented with his long service officers decoration by the G.O.C. It was then announced that "C" Company, commanded by Major d'Esterre, had won the battalion shield for 1924-25. This is a shield which is competed for annually by the companies, and last season was won by "D" Company.

Gen. Eimsley, in his remarks, congratulated the battalion on the splendid showing it had made and said it had been very difficult to decide which company should get the honor of the shield. Special praise was given the signallers, under Capt. Cannon, and the bearers under Capt. Jones, M.O., for the efficiency they had displayed in the manoeuvres.

The C.O. definitely announced that the battalion is going to Belleville on June 16th to take part in the U.E.L. celebration. They expect to go up over two hundred strong.

Following these ceremonies refreshments were served to the men in their rooms.

AMOS STRUNK IS BACK WITH CONNIE MACK'S CREW

Philadelphia, May 31.—Seldom does a big league play four separate engagements with the same team. Such is the experience of Amos Strunk, veteran outfielder, recently signed by Connie Mack to an Athletic contract.

Connie Mack discovered Strunk back in 1909, and apparently he means to help him stick around as a major leaguer after all other leaders are positive he is through.

Strunk played a very short engagement with the Athletics in 1909, but lacked experience and was turned over to the Milwaukee club of the American Association.

A year in that organization convinced Mack that Strunk was of major league caliber. He was brought back to the Athletics in 1910, remaining until 1917.

Mack then sent him in a trade to Boston in 1917, where he tarried for two years. In 1919 he was sent back to Mack in another deal between Boston and the Athletics.

The following season he was sold to the Chicago White Sox at the waiver price. Recently Chicago gave him his unconditional release, making him a free agent.

For the fourth time Mack takes him on as utility outfielder and pinch hitter. On his first appearance he made good with a hit.

Strunk has seen a lot of the country during his major league career. It looks as if he will end it where he started, in Philadelphia.
