WOMAN'S INSTITUTE.

Battersea. On May 28th, in the Orange Temple, Battersea, an open meeting of the Woman's Institute was held when Miss E. C. Guest, was the special speaker. Miss Guest has had much experience in institute work, both in this country and in the motherland, where at the time of the war she lectured for the British Board of Agriculture on good production and conservation. Her subject on Wednesday evening was "How to Make an Efficiency Study of Yourself and Your Community."

Efficiency of oneself was dealt with under the heads of health, life work, recreation and returns for work done. In each case Miss Guest showed what efficiency meant, how it could be more nearly attained. How to study personal efficiency was then broadened to include community efficiency. The chief factor in securing community efficiency is co-operation among the members. It is in this way that the institutes everywhere have accomplished and are accomplishing such wonderful results. Chocolate Ice Cream: Beat two eggs slightly and add to them one-half cup of flour, one cup of sugar, and two cups of sweet milk. Turn the mixture into the top of a double boiler and let cook for 20 minutes, stirring constantly during the first ten minutes and occasionally after that. In the meantime melt two squares of unsweetened chocolate, add to this chocolate two tablespoons of sugar and two tablespoons of boiling water and let the mixture cook till glossy in a small saucepan (stirring constantly). When the egg-mixture in the double boiler has cooked 20 minutes, add to it this chocolate slump, let all cook together for a moment longer, then remove from fire, cool and chill. When very cold, stir into it a pinch of salt, one tablespoon of vanilla, and two cups of this cream. Turn into a freezer can, not filling can more than three-fourths full, and freeze as any cream. Serve with the following:

Marshmallow Sauce for Chocolate Ice Cream: Cut one-half pound of marshmallows into small bits and melt these in the top of a double boiler. Dissolve two cups of confectioners' sugar in two-thirds of a cup of boiling water and add this to the melted marshmallows. Stir till blended, remove from range and cool before serving on the ice cream.
