**The Church Givings.**  
Givings of the Presbyterian congregations to the 1923 budget, including special offerings, were \$1,211,630, as compared with \$1,194,584 in 1922 and \$905,092 in 1918, according to the report of Dr. Robert Laird, chairman of the treasury board, to the General Assembly. Budget revenue exceeded disbursements by \$30,444, and th accumulated deficits of \$358,558 were reduced to \$328,113. This, plus \$69,964.56 deficits from the colleges, represents the total indebtedness of the church.
