Hagerman, who had been hitting well all the afternoon, lined one over short and Roddick, racing in, grabbed the ball off his shoe strings for the third out. This was a promising rally nipped in the bud.

Oulette had a little on Dainty as regards hurling. He struck out seven, walked two and allowed only four hits, while Dainty walked the same number, allowed six hits and whiffed five. The one error chalked against the Belleville team was quite costly. **NO TIME TO RETRENCH**

In Regard to Foreign Missionary Effort—Meeting of Chalmers W.M.S.

What great steps have been taken by the Presbyterian W.M.S. of Canada even in the last ten years was outlined in reports given at Chalmers W.M.S. on Wednesday afternoon by the president, Mrs. J. F. McFadyen, a Chalmers delegate to the tenth provincial conference of the W.M.S. held in Hamilton in April, and by Mrs. S. W. Dyde, a delegate to the recent Kingston Presbyterian annual at Trenton.

In 1914, when there were no Young Women's Auxiliaries or C.G.I. T. groups, the total membership in Canada was 37,973, this year it is 92,000. In the same time the amount of money sent in to the General Treasurer increased from \$69,397.81 to \$245,938.71, and the number of subscribers to the W.M.S. organ, "The Missionary Messenger," from 23,748 to 26,228.

It was announced at the Hamilton conference that the year had seen the largest contingent of missionaries ever sent out by the Presbyterian Board, a total of twelve being appointed to the foreign field. Addresses by many missionaries on furlough called for a revival of missionary enthusiasm on the part of the Home Church. Some cannot return to their fields for lack of funds.

The new W.M.S. hospital at Hearst, Northern Ontario, is almost completed. Requests for another in the same part of the province have been received. Funds are available for a new school home and perhaps a high school in Ontario.

The Hamilton conference, by a standing vote, decided to ask the next General Assembly to receive by ordination women qualifying for the ministry of the church.

A very interesting report of the Trenton convention was given by Mrs. Dyde, who emphasized the need of greater missionary activity at home in support of those in foreign fields, and urged the great need of our newcomers in Western Canada. Many of these are without religious service of any kind and money to send men and women is not forthcoming. The call for laborers in this our home vineyard is very great.

Rev. J. D. McCrae of Stratburg, China, who addressed the Trenton conference, twice declared very strongly that now was no time for retrenchment in the work. China was waiting for the Gospel, the opportunity was great and we must avail ourselves of it. Greater activity in both home and foreign fields was needed, not retrenchment.

two in a row for the amateurs by winning the championship the following year at Minikahda with a score of 286, a mark which has yet to be equaled.

Jones crashed through last summer at Inwood after a dramatic play-off with Wes Bobby Cruickshank.

Thus four amateurs have stepped in and taken all the glory from the professionals since 1913.
