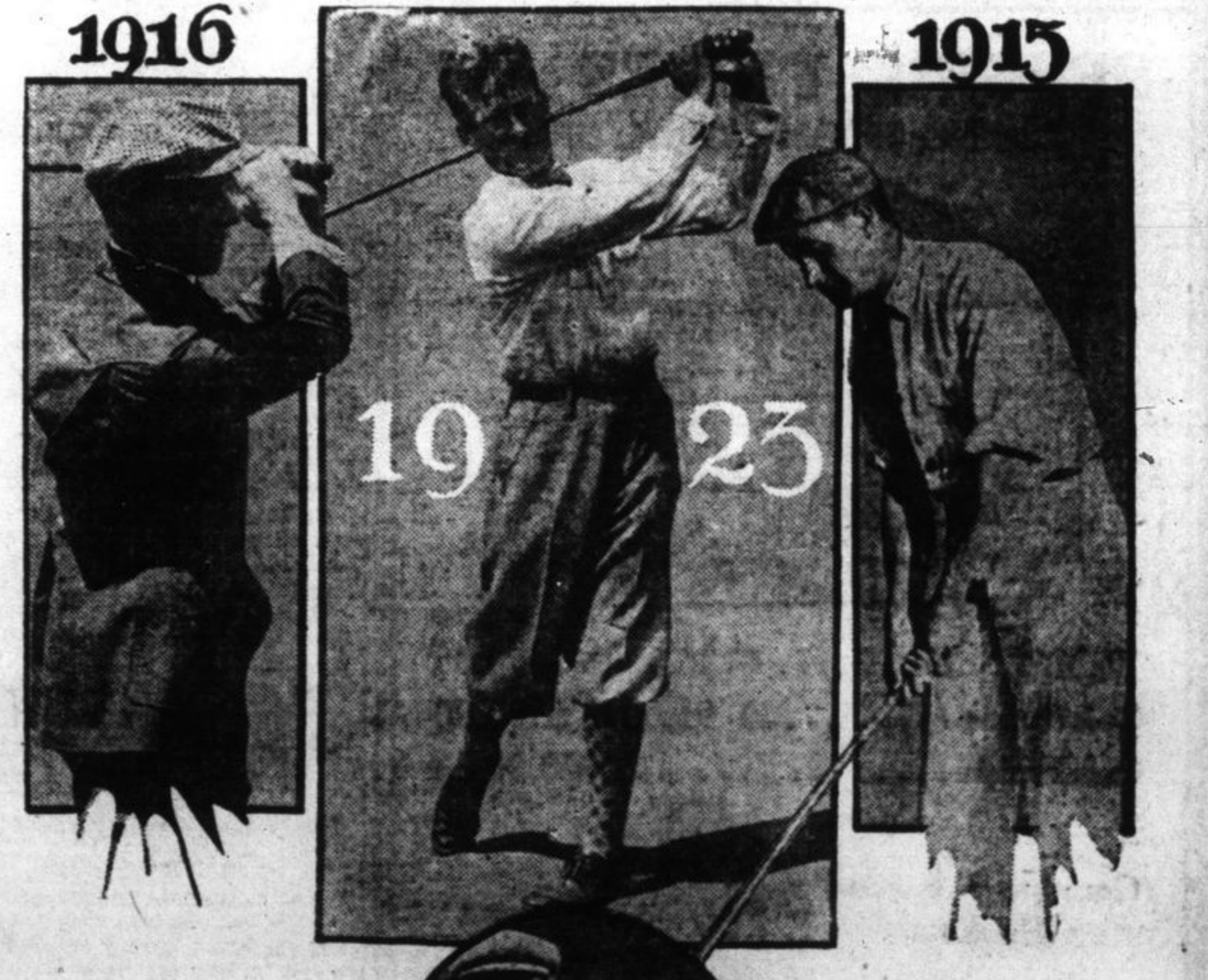

**CAN BOBBY JONES, FOURTH AMATEUR TO HOLD OPEN GOLF TITLE, REPEAT?**



**CHIC EVANS**

In the play for the open golf championship of America, over the Oakland Hills course, Detroit, Bobby Jones, Atlanta, an amateur, is the defending champion.

Jones is the fourth amateur in the history of the game in America to take the field as a defender.

No amateur has ever repeated in the open.

Francis Ouimet, Boston, was the first amateur to win the event, the caddy graduate triumphing at Brookline in 1913.

Jerry Travers, New York, scored in 1915 at Baltusrol and was the second amateur to achieve the distinction.

two in a row for the amateurs by winning the championship the following year at Minkasha with a score of 256, a mark which has yet to be equaled.

Jones crashed through last summer at Inwood after a dramatic play-off with Wee Bobby Cruickshank.

Thus four amateurs have stepped in and taken all the glory from the professionals since 1913.

It follows then that the percentage is against an amateur winning this year.

But Jones is the greatest stroke player in the game, bar none, and he figures to be dangerous all the way, tradition or no tradition.
