Thorough disinfection of homes. Do not allow your family to move into any room, house or workshop where a consumptive has lived, worked or died without careful disinfection by the Board of Health or your doctor.

Stop promiscuous spitting not only in your own home but in the streets and other public places.

Try and have a little consideration for others.

See that light, air and cleanliness predominate in our homes, offices, schools and workshops.

Care for your body. A clean, healthy body is your greatest asset against disease.

Soap and water are cheap. Don't spare them-they are among the very best preventative measures

Wear clean, warm, light clothing

Other Sources of Infection. There are a number of other sources of infection, but they are not very important and we need only of consumptives, the regular use by well people of their unwashed clothing, and careless contact with the pus or other discharges from tuberculous sores. It has been shown that there can be a danger of infection from the unwashed hands of consumptives, and all such patients should wash their hands, faces and mouths frequently.


Latent Tuberculosis. As has already been shown, when this disease is acquired, it does not usually develop at once, but lies mention a few, such as the kissing latent in the body anywhere from one to twenty years. During this time it may sometimes cause some symptoms which only a doctor would recognize, and which pass off so soon that the patient pays no attention to them. Thus people who are subject to repeated spells of "grippe" or colds every winter, or to attacks of pleurisy now and again, those who suffer from periods of "rundownness" or who are habitually pale and below normal weight or are chronic coughers and spitters, are very apt to be tuberculous, and often unconsciously hand on the disease by their cough to others.




