STATISTICAL REPORT

Presented to the Montreal Methodist Conference. Gananogue, June 9.—The statistical report, presented to the Montreal Methodist Conference on Saturday by Rev. T. P. Shaver, contained the following information: Membership in the Montreal Conference, 25,407 (decrease of 39), families, 25,407 (increase, 27); baptisms, 2,044, marriages, 1,034; burials, 1,336. Connexional funds included \$8,309 for educational purposes, \$5,511 for evangelism and social service (increase, \$1,119), missionary gifts, \$106,861; religious education, \$3,062; Women's Missionary, \$44,236 (increase, \$3,625), superannuation fund for ministers, \$11,371; from circuits, \$27,504; receipts of Quarterly Boards, \$124,357 (increase, \$27,383), for Sunday Schools, \$52,620; Young People's Societies, \$9,846; Ladies' Aid, \$96,234 (increase \$7,177), Men's Societies, \$4,347; for ministerial support, \$278,545. Grand total for all purposes, \$1,100,031—an increase of \$63,932.

Upon their return the happy couple will reside in Toronto.

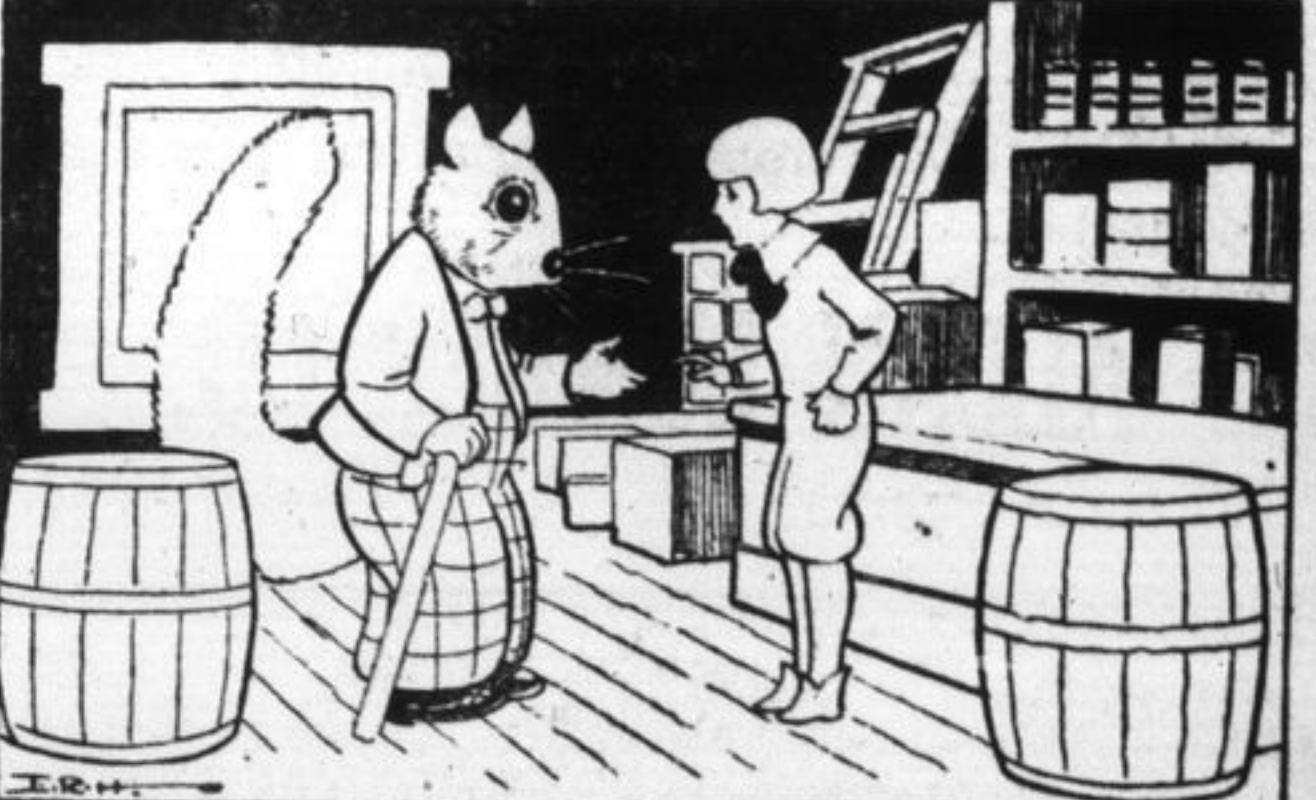

CHURCH UNION DEBATE.

Not Being Restricted at General Assembly Meeting. Owen Sound, June 9.—Rev. Dr. Ephraim Scott, Montreal, largely responsible for the formation of the Presbyterian Church Association, was the first speaker at the resumption of the debate on church union this afternoon. It is very likely that a separate vote will be taken on the church union resolutions. There is no intention to restrict the debate on the question, so that it is a question whether a vote will be reached to-day.

Steamer Saskatoon Damaged.

St. Catharines, June 8.—While endeavoring to pass the long level of the Welland canal between Welland and Port Colborne yesterday, the steamer Saskatoon of Montreal, up-bound collided with the steamer Burlington Chicago, down. The Saskatoon suffered the most serious damage, her port bow being stove in, and she is leaking badly. The hole was temporarily patched with cement, and she will be held at Port Dalhousie pending the arrival of the Underwriters inspector.

Body Found in Bush.

Belleville, June 9.—Mrs. James Hoyle, Carlow township, North Hastings, some two weeks ago wandering from her home, where she lived alone and her body has been found in a bush some distance away. The woman was about forty years of age and rather eccentric.

Her death is being investigated by the provincial police of this city.
