"Ted" Gallagher Said His Team Would Win in Belleville And They Did.

Belleville, June 18 .- Showing abundance of pep and flushed with victory from their last two starts, the Limestone Crew invaded Belleville, and before one of the largest crowds that ever witnessed a game in this city, the occasion being the U. E. L. Celebration, carried off a well earned victory six to five, the win being due to hitting in the pinches.

A few preliminaries were engaged in. W. D. Robb, vice-president f the Canadian National Railway System, was an interested spectator and threw the first ball, with J. D. Mc-Milian, of the same system in the role of hitter.

Kelly started the game but gave way to Gallagher in the sixth. As his team was leading when he went out he is credited with the win but the credit must fall to Gallagher who held the opposition after Kelly had allowed three runs with two men out in the fifth. It was not his day and from the first it was only a question of time when he would crack. "Teddy" came through and he was ably supported by his teammates, especially Compeau, the brilliant short stop. This boy is a find of the first water and has a more promising career in the profession than any other player in this league. He accepted eight chances without a miss, several of them being hard and robbed Belleville of sure hits. He covered acres of ground, three splendidly and got three safe blows in five trips to the platter. 

In Organization of St. Lawrence Fish and Game Protective Association.

Considerable interest is being shown by citizens in the organization of the St. Lawrence River Fish and Game Protective Association. Since the announcement last week of the formation of this body, a number of citizens have sent in their dollar bills for membership. C. R. Webster, the solicitor for the association, has drawn up by-laws similar to those used by similar organizations in the province, such as the

protective association of Sudbury. The need of such an organization is pointed out by a resident who has been a follower of this kind of sport all his life and who has been in close touch with local conditions. At one time fishing about Kingston was exceptionally good and many American tourists were attracted here for that reason. The proprietor of a local hotel had a yacht and it was not an uncommon sight to see it going up the lake in the morning with half a dozen rowboats of American tourists in tow. Then licenses for hoop and gill nets were granted and the St. Lawrence's reputation for fishing accordingly diminished. The same authority claims that experience has shown it is almost an axiom here that the fewer the nets the more

fish there are.

The new association is not only seeking to abolish all net licenses but to prevent illegal fishing of all kinds. The same resident tells of two local men coming across a gill net, without any name on it, at "The Specks." The net ran for two miles and contained around seventy-five large bass. A government boat found another unnamed net with fifty bass in it. Stories are also told of motorboats coming by night, presumably from the American side, to the local shores to take home cargoes of fish. The association is against all sale of game, it being pointed out that whereas a fisherman might get twenty-five cents for a bass a tourist might be attracted here by the hope of catching such a specimen. Another improvement desired by members of the association is that day fishermen here from the States should not be given fishing privileges for the season for the same fee (\$5) as tourists who come here, hire local guides and enhance the tills of local hotels. In these ways tourist traffic to this centre would be encouraged.


