## REDUCING NUMBER OF COUNTY JUDGES

### Bill to Amend the Judges Act Given Third Reading in Commons.

Ottawa, June 19.—A bill to amend the Judges' Act in regard to the residence of county or district court judges in Ontario was given a second reading in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon without debate, and was then discussed in committee, which gave it third reading. The Minister of Justice, Hon. Ernest Lapointe, explained that the bill was designed to co-operate with the province of Ontario in reducing the number of county judges. An Ontario act provides for the consolidation of two or more counties to form a judicial district, and the object of the present bill is to permit the governor-in-council to fix a place of residence for a district, whereas at present he is required to reside within a county.

### BORN ABOARD SHIP TINY JAP IS BRITISH

#### The Baby Is Named After An Ottawa Doctor Who Officialates.

Vancouver, B.C., June 19.—Because he was born at sea under the British flag a Japanese baby, who first saw the light of day twenty-four hours out of Yokohama on the Canadian Pacific S. S. Empress of Russia, will be registered in the parish of Stepney, London, England.

The Empress of Russia docked here yesterday afternoon from the Orient, and of her 1,000 passengers 250 were Japanese men, women, and children intent on entering the United States before July 1st. The baby was named Anson, for the ship's surgeon, Lieut.-Comdr Anson S. Donaldson, D.S.O., M.D., of Ottawa, formerly an officer in the Canadian Army Medical Corps, and later in charge of the S.C.R. at Calgary, Alta. There were almost 100 kimono clad Japanese picture brides among the third class passengers.

### Japanese Are Rushing To Beat Alien Ban

Seattle, June 19.—Immigration inspectors, examining 238 Japanese who arrived yesterday aboard the liner President McKinley with passports from Japan found scores who claimed long years of residence in this country who could not speak a word of English, according to officers of the immigration station.

Advices received by the department in Seattle asserted that 2,700 Japanese will seek entrance to the United States through this port before July 1st when the Japanese exclusion act becomes effective. Dozens of brides and bridegrooms were among the passengers.

Manchester, N.H., June 19.—Gordon Woodbury, former United States Assistant Secretary of the Navy, and for many years a leader in the Democratic party politics in this state, dropped dead in a store in this city yesterday.
