SMUTS VOTED OUT.

Gen. Jan C. Smuts, last of the great figures of the world war to serve prominently in government, has been voted out in the Union of South Africa. He was defeated by a Labor party man in the parliamentary elections, the general result of which is the relegating of the South African party to a minority position.

This party remains the largest single body in the parliament, but the Laborites and Nationalists together outrank it. The world-wide unrest, coupled with South African aspirations for independence, has worked a political overturn in this section of the British Empire similar to those that have been effected in many other countries.

THE POPULAR PRINCE.

It is a far cry from the days when every patriotic American orator was expected to tweak the British Lion's tail to the invitation just extended by the American Legion to the Prince of Wales to attend its next convention.

Col. Lindsley, who presented the invitation on behalf of the Legion, predicted that the welcome from the ambassador of peace would be unequalled by any demonstration that has yet taken place or may come after.

Not for many years has a member of British royalty achieved such genuine popularity among his people. The dash and pluck and democracy of the Prince of Wales have made an irresistible appeal.

The British especially admire sportsmanship, and the Prince has shown that he is a good sport. The conservative oldsters condemn his recklessness, but they would be equally severe if he were a mollycoddle.

It is pointed out that for the Prince to accept such an invitation would break all precedents. But young Wales has never seemed to be any more afraid of breaking a precedent than of breaking his neck.

And so you'll hear one chap say 'I'm cutting down a bit on my meats, as my doctor tells me my blood pressure is a trifle high.'

Another will say, that having had a number of attacks of tonsillitis, and his blood pressure being too high, his doctor is of the opinion that some of the inflammatory material has injured his arteries and taken some of the elasticity out of them.

And so many of these people have begun to talk about their arteries as they tubing.

As mentioned before, when the walls get hard, fibrous tissue taking the place of the elastic tissue, naturally the heart has to pump the blood at higher pressure through these hard tubes, and the pressure goes up.

And the greatest thing in the world to prevent hard arteries is to eat less food, and to take enough exercise to keep the intestine active.

There are many other things blamed for causing hardening of the arteries, and it must be admitted that heredity is a big factor, but the physicians on this, and the other side of the water, are almost completely in accord in stating that overeating and constipation are the most frequent causes.
