Instead of the usual over-developed, unconvincing story, here is a page from life itself, with all the satire, subtle humor and appeal of a sparkling continental story. It is a story of a married flirt whose greatest delight lies in enticing other women's husbands.

The complications that result are exceedingly humorous and never at any time depart from the plausible, which in itself would put the picture in the class of pictures destined to live. Aside from that, there is the excellent directing of Lubitch, who in this picture outdoes even his own former record, the inspired acting of the cast, and the smoothness which characterized the whole performance, making it spin merrily along without a single jarring note.
