CHANGING LIQUOR LAWS.

By vote of the people, government control was introduced, providing for the sale of liquor in sealed containers by government stores. At the provincial election a few days ago, the people were asked to vote on whether or not the sale of beer by the glass should be permitted. This proposed change in the liquor laws was voted down by a large majority, showing that the people there were quite satisfied with their present laws, and had no desire to modify them any

TRIAL BY JURY WOMEN. That Body Dours

By James W. Barton, M.D. Summer Complaint.

The summertime brings its blessings with all that the outdoor life means to that body of yours. But it also brings along a distressing ailment which you call diarrhoea.

There seems to be a general idea abroad that because the weather is warm in the summer, that the drinking of too much water is the cause of the trouble.

Now while it is admitted that ice cold water into a hot stomach can cause diarrhoea, nevertheless it is not the water itself, but the shock, that causes the waves along the intestine.

If however, the water itself is not pure, then it will act just like any other liquid that has decomposed. The poisonous matter irritates the side walls of the intestine and causes the pain and excessive flow of the watery contents of the blood.

Some foods seem to irritate more than others, particularly the coarser varieties. The action of unripe fruits seem to set up a chemical change and the resultant product in turn irritates the intestine. Fish that are not fresh, or out of season, decompose rapidly inside the body, and you have practically a poisonous condition therefrom. Some of the concoctions you put into you in the summer may have milk that is stale. Or perhaps the ice cream, or Not that the actress' life or honor the cream in cakes is just a bit "off."

Of course there are cases due to sudden fright, to fear, or other emotional disturbances. Some folks wear a wide band around the waist, claiming that a chill across the abdomen always brings on an attack. And the

Rest in bed is essential to ensure rapid recovery of strength.


