Cheese Price Drops.
Cheese fell 11-16th of a cent at the Frontenac Cheese Board on Thursday afternoon and several of the factories refused to sell. The price offered was 16 1-16th cents at which 218 cheese were sold of the 418 boarded. Took Degree At Queen's.
A very impressive ordination service was held in St. George's church, Fitzroy Harbor, when the Bishop of Ottawa advanced to the holy priesthood the Rev. George Howard Landon Sadler, a native of the parish of Fitzroy. In the autumn of 1918 he entered Queen's University, graduating as a bachelor of arts in an English course in 1921. The Bishop of Ottawa has appointed Mr. Sadler as priest in charge of the mission parish of Combermere, where he will take up his duties at once.

New County Treasurer.
The Renfrew County Council selected Walford A. Biggs, son of Reeves G. D. Biggs, of Alice as the new county treasurer as successor to Thomas Henderson. The appointee is twenty-four years of age. He is to be paid \$1,500 a year out of which he is required to pay his assistant. Mr. Henderson has been receiving \$1,500 per annum, with an allowance of \$750 for an assistant. Mr. Biggs took over his duties on July 1st. In recognition of fifteen years faithful service, Mr. Henderson, the retiring treasurer, was granted an honorarium of \$1,500.

A Phenomenal Occurrence.
The Bay of Quinte was the scene of a most phenomenal occurrence when within a period of six hours the waters of the bay had a rise and fall of from three to five feet. Those who visited the waterfront in the early morning were astonished at the peculiar highness of the water, and more so when they noticed the rapidity of the fall, and within a period of a half an hour the waters again rose to a height of four feet above this year's high water mark. The quickness of the rise and fall was accompanied by a very swift running tide.

DYNAMITE FOR BODIES.
