Cornwall, Ont., July 4.—While Church Union has been a subject of much debate in the Dominion Parliament at Ottawa, the matter has been solved for the next two months, at least so far as four of Cornwall's churches are concerned. Beginning on Sunday next and continuing during July and August, the congregations of Knox and St. John's Presbyterian churches will worship together. While the Rev. James Faulls of Knox church, is on vacation during July, all services will be held in St. John's church and while the Rev. Hugh Munroe, of St. John's, is on his holidays in August the services will be held in Knox church. The Baptists and Methodists have also adopted the union plan. Rev. S. J. Farmer, of the Baptist church, will be away during July and all services will be taken by the Rev. Daniel Mick, the new pastor of the Methodist church. The Rev. Mr. Farmer will be in charge of the united services during August. THREE MONTHS IN JAIL ON CHARGE OF THEFT. A Warrant is issued for a Fellow Who disobeyed a Summons. James Wright, an able-bodied young man came before Magistrate Farrell on Friday morning on a charge of theft. The charge was that he did steal a sum of money from one Howard H. Smith. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to three months in jail. Asked by the magistrate if he had been working, the accused said "No." Frank Nicholson, another young man, was before the court charged with vagrancy but he stoutly denied the charge and was remanded for a day. A foreigner employed in a local restaurant was "run in" for being intoxicated. He said he got his liquor on a doctor's order but it is alleged that another fellow got him the liquor. The magistrate remanded him for three months or until such time as he tells where he secured his liquor. William Rousehorn is missing, and so is the money that he should have paid for his board. At least this is the complaint made to the police. He is charged with "jumping his board bill," and was summoned to answer to the charge but was "conspicuous by his absence." Constable Vernon Campbell gave evidence to the effect that he had served the accused with a summons on Princess street at 10.45 Thursday morning and afterwards the magistrate issued a warrant for the arrest of the accused. Music Examinations. Examinations conducted by the Toronto Conservatory of Music, which commenced here on Saturday, concluded Thursday afternoon. They were held at the Notre Dame convent last Saturday and during this week in Chalmers Sunday school hall. G. D. Atkinson, of the Conservatory staff, conducted the examinations. Over 150 candidates tried. Civil Service Superannuation. Ottawa, July 4.—After an afternoon's discussion, the Civil Service Superannuation bill yesterday passed committee stage in the House and now stands for third reading. During the proceedings, a clause was inserted providing that if he retires at 70 — two years hence — W. B. Northrup, Clerk of the House, will receive \$2,500 per annum as retiring allowance.
