



To Represent Canada at Inter-Allied Conference.

Ottawa, July 4.-It is expected that Hon. J. A. Robb, acting Minister of Finance, will represent Canada at the Inter-Allied conference to be held in London next month for the consideration of the Dawes report and its solution of European troubles. Premier King will be unable to go, according to the Citizen. The British Government, as previously indicated has asked all the dominions to be represented, and it is intended to accept the invitation,
