We question whether those who have advanced this argument have seriously considered the situation which the Government must have faced, had it set itself to consider the question of winding up the bank at that early date.

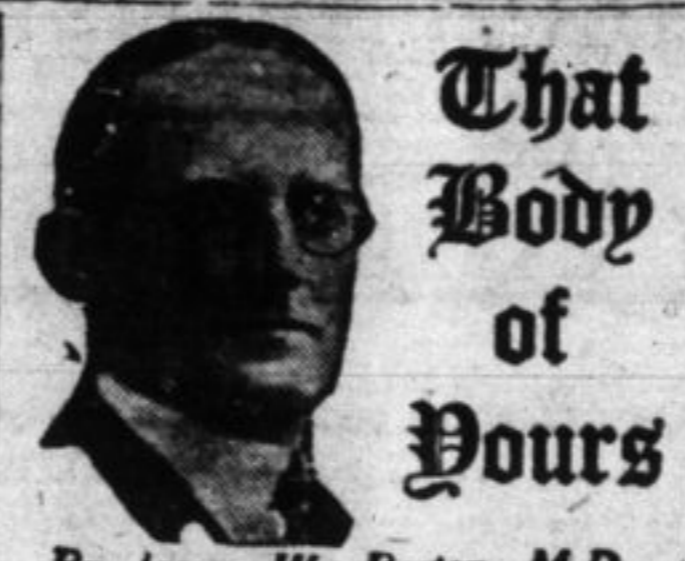
