Ontario Medical Regulations.

The students at present attending Queen's medical college are all on six-year courses, the last of the five year students have graduated this spring. The demands of the Dominion Medical Council are satisfied as long as a student has fulfilled the requirements of the Ontario Council up to the latter's final examination.
