which contains a piece of gum arabic as large as a nutmeg. This gum arabic can be obtained from a drugstore, is a substitute for starch in stiffening a sheer dress, and must be well dissolved before the dress is rinsed in the water containing it. (Note: Gum arabic is also fine for stiffening any dark colored material on which white starch could not be used. It is excellent to use in washing a child's dark hair ribbons, or in laundering dark-colored voile dresses.)

To Launder Muslins: Set colors as described above, also wash the same.




