



BY-LAW NO. 40 B

By-law for the closing of a part of the Highway on the Boundary Be-tween the Townships of Portland and Loughboro and Diverting the High-way at the Said Place.

WHEREAS it is desirable that the part of the highway on the boundary between the Townships of Portland and Loughboro from road allowance between Con's 7 and 8 at Knowlton Lake, north to beginning of proposed diversion, be closed and the road diverted on to Lot 1, Con. 8, of the Township of Portland, as in plan prepared by the Colonization Road Branch, Toronto, and filed with the Clerk of the Townthip of Loughboro.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the said Corporation of the Township of Loughboro, that the highway above mentioned between the townships of Portland and Loughboro be closed and the above mentioned diversion made.
