

George Mortimer Pullman produced the car that bears his name in the year 1859, but the date for the first sleeper turned out from the Great Western shops in Hamilton is given as 1857. Construction work on the Great Western was started in 1851 and by 1854 the line was built across the Niagara River and as far west as Detroit. and by 1857 exceeded a length of three hundred and fifty miles. From 1853 the investment had paid a dividend of six per cent! and a substantial bonus. There were therefore the necessary funds and a length of line sufficient to call for sleeping cars to offset the competition that was being offered by the newly organized Grand Trunk. which had been chartered in 1853. 
