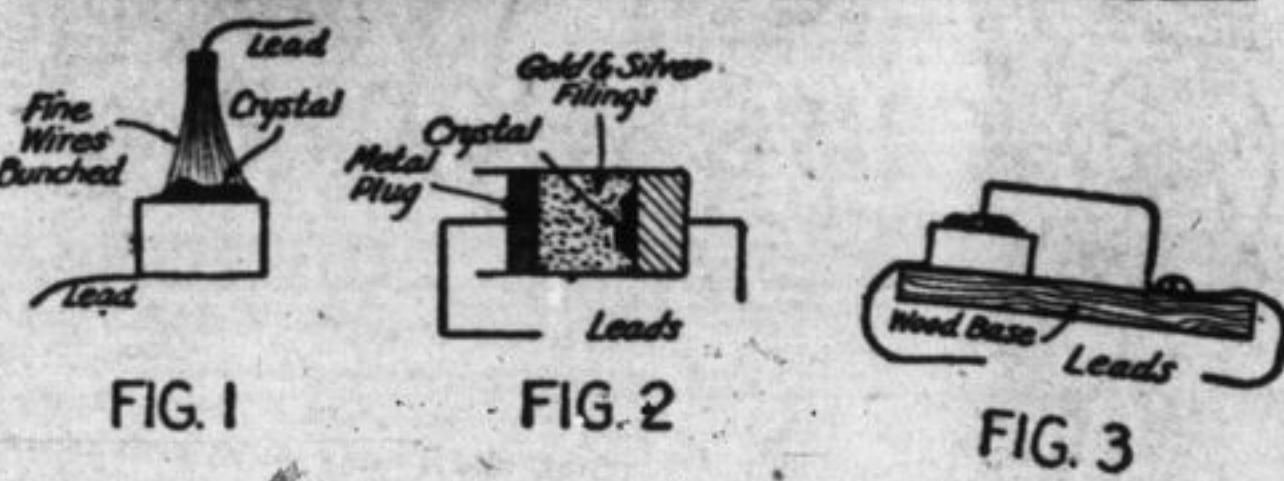

### Good and Bad "Permanent" Crystal Detectors

Ever since the discovery of the crystal detector back in the early days of radio, the objective of all crystal users has been to discover some mineral, or some way to use the present minerals, so that sensitivity and permanency could both be obtained.

There are several very sensitive crystals, but usually the very sensitive ones are hard to keep in adjustment; on the other hand there are certain crystals like carbonborundum that are practically non-critical as far as adjustment is concerned, but are not particularly sensitive.

Galena, silicon and iron pyrites remain as about the most desirable forms of mineral detectors. There are, however, several brands of synthetic or "manufactured" crystals which are just about as good.

Galena, the old standby, comes to us in partly "manufactured" form, and is probably the most sensitive of the three enumerated in the paragraph above. However, it is necessary to use a fairly light pressure from a single point of wire for best results, and this is not conducive to permanency. Galena detectors are usually easily knocked out of adjustment. Silicon, on the other hand, is almost as sensitive, and on account of the fact that good results can be had with it when a blue point

with considerable pressure behind it is used, is somewhat more permanent in adjustment. The pyrites detector is not quite as sensitive as the other two.

In Figs. 1 and 2 are shown two common ways of making "permanent" detectors using galena or silicon. These are not advised, however, for the following reason: It is true that one of the many fine wires in the arrangement shown in Fig. 1, or one of the filaments in the method in Fig. 2, is very likely to hit a sensitive spot on the crystal surface. At the same time, however, the many other points of contact on non-sensitive or partially-sensitive spots will absorb some of the energy, and will cause losses that may result in a very noticeable reduction of signal strength.

For those who want the nearest thing to a permanent crystal detector combining good sensitivity, we recommend the arrangement shown in Fig. 3. The crystal in this case should be one of the "all-sensitive" synthetic crystals, and the wire contact is a fairly stiff and solid contact, bearing down with considerable pressure. On account of the many sensitive points on the crystals in question, even should the wire be jarred around somewhat in operation, it is probable that it will always be bearing on a sensitive spot.
