EARTHQUAKE SHOOK DISTINCTLY FELT

The Seismographs at Toronto and Ottawa Both Register Local Disturbances.

Toronto, July 15.—A sharp earthquake, described as of "local origin" and lasting two minutes was recorded on the seismograph at the observatory here last evening at 7.10, seventy-fifth meridian time. Reports reaching the city were to the effect that the shock had been felt and recorded in Eastern Ontario, the seismograph at Ottawa registering the duration for approximately four minutes.

ST. LAWRENCE SCHEME ENDED FOR PRESENT

Bill of Canal and Power Company Withdrawn by Commons Railway Committee

Ottawa, July 15.—The five hundred million dollar scheme for the construction of a St. Lawrence deep waterway scheme to the great lakes was ended for the present session when the railway committee of the House this morning advised that the bill be withdrawn.

It was the scheme of a company which sought incorporation under the name of the Confederation Canal and Power Company, with a capitalization of half a billion and with head offices at Montreal.

In the swimming trials the Australians led in these events so far run off, the 1500 metre free style for men and the 400 metre free style for women. George Vernot, Canadian representative, finished second in his heat, but failed to qualify in the final.

In the rowing the Canadian four from Vancouver defeated the Swiss team in the semifinal and will meet England in the final. To-day, the Varsity eight-oared crew from Canada will compete with U. S. and Holland in the preliminary. The Yale crew is the strongest in years, and will be hard to eliminate.

The Australian and Canadian rowing crews have been invited to row on the Thames on July 27th, as guests of the Thames Rowing Club.

YALE THE VICTORS.

Defeat Canada and Holland in Olympic Eight-oared Race.

Paris, July 15.—The Yale crew, competing in the Olympic rowing events, won the second heat for the United States in the eight-oared crew competition to-day, defeating Canada and Holland. The Yale crew clinched a place in finals by a brilliant exhibition of oarsmanship, leading the shell of Toronto University, representing Canada, by three and one-half lengths, and Holland by five lengths in what seemed just a good workout for the Americans.

The Canadians got away to the fastest start, but Yale crew took command at the 500 metre mark, gradually widened the gap and finished the 2,000 metre course in 5 minutes 51 seconds, much faster than the British eight, which won the previous heat in 6 minutes and 4 seconds.

Andrew Charlton, Australian swimming star, won the final of the 1,500 metre swim, free style, in the Olympic competition on Tuesday. Charlton's time was 20 minutes 7 seconds, breaking the world's record.

LT.-COL. F. O. HODGINS TO SERVE IN ENGLAND

Under the Exchange of Officers' Scheme—To Be Away Two Years.

Lt.-Col. F. O. Hodgins, D.S.O., R.C. E., 5th Bn. Buffs., M.D. No. 3, has been selected as one of the officers to proceed to England in accordance with a plan for exchange of officers throughout the empire. Col. Hodgins, who is at present in St. John's, Que., in connection with the militia staff course, will likely proceed overseas in September and will probably be absent two years.

The scheme by which Col. Hodgins has received his appointment provides for an exchange of officers of the forces in the British Isles and India with those of Canada, Australia, New Zealand, etc. The selection is a distinct honor to the local officer.

BIG PROFITS MADE IN THE GRAIN MARKET

By Arthur W. Cutten, Chicago, Who Predicted Increased Price for Corn.

Chicago, July 15.—Profits of between \$1,500,000 and \$1,800,000 are estimated by brokers to have been made by Arthur W. Cutten, Chicago grain merchant, in a sale of the last 300,000 bushels of a big holding of July corn at around \$1.10, in addition to over \$500,000 on the recent wheat advances of from 20 to 25 cents bushel in Chicago and Winnipeg markets. James a Paton, whose attempts to corner wheat, corn, oats and cotton have made him famous and brought him fortune, is also reported to have reaped considerable profits through the recent disposal of 2,000,000 bushels of oats purchased in May when dealers predicted big losses. A month ago Mr. Cotten predicted corn would reach a dollar a bushel before the end of July. He persisted in this belief and wet weather, which retarded the crop, vindicated his judgment.
