A By-law for the closing of a part of the highway on the boundary between the townships of Portland and Loughboro from road allowance between Concessions 7 and 8 at Knowlton Lake, North to beginning of proposed diversion be closed and the road diverted on to Lot 1, Con. 8, of the township of Portland, as in plan prepared by the Colonization Road Branch, Toronto, and filed with the clerk of the Township of Portland.

WHEREAS it is desirable that the part of the highway on the boundary between the townships of Portland and Loughboro from road allowance between Concessions 7 and 8 at Knowlton Lake, North to beginning of proposed diversion be closed and the road diverted on to Lot 1, Con. 8, of the township of Portland, as in plan prepared by the Colonization Road Branch, Toronto, and filed with the clerk of the Township of Portland.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE Township of Portland that the highway above mentioned between the townships of Portland and Loughboro be closed and the above mentioned diversion made.

Canuck Boxers Win. Although two of the Canadian boxers were disqualified for being over eight and several more had to remain inactive on account of new limits on the number of entries, the Canadians came out well in the preliminary bouts at the Olympic. Graham, lightweight, A. S. Rennie and Johnny McGregor, flyweights, and Les. Black, middleweight, won their battles in the preliminaries without trouble.

Yale Oarsmen Win. Canada Second, Italy Third and Great Britain Fourth. Argentoull, France, July 17.—Yale's championship eight-oared crew won the Olympic eight-oared race to-day. Canada second, Italy third, Great Britain fourth. The time of the United States winning crew was 6 minutes 33.2-5 seconds; distance two thousand metres (about one mile).

Yale crossed the finish line three and one half lengths ahead of Canada, setting a new record for the course.

The victory of the United States in the eight-oared event made her winner of the Olympic rowing competition, giving her 33 points to Switzerland's 32.

Argentoull, France, July 17.—England's four oared crew, without coxswain, defeated Vancouver club, Canada's representative, in the finals for this event, here this afternoon.

Switzerland won the four oared race with coxswain, in the Olympic rowing championship contested.

The single sculls race was won to-day, by Jack Beresford, Jr., Great Britain, who defeated W. E. Garrett Gilmore, Philadelphia, his United States rival.

Olympic Swimming Winners. Les Tourelles, France, July 17.—Johnny Weismuller, United States, finished first in the semi-finals of the Olympic 400 metre free style swim. His time was five minutes, 13.1-6 seconds. Andrew Charlton, Australia, was second and Lester Smith, United States, third.

Another Cub For Queen's. Queen Boo-Hoo has been dethroned. She has become too fractious of late and a successor in the form of a young bear cub is coming down from northern Ontario to carry the Queen's tricolor. The new mascot is due to arrive in two or three weeks.

Passed With Honors. Miss Helen Anglin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. R. Anglin, Queen street, has successfully passed the examinations, with honors, at the Conservatory of Music, Toronto, and has been awarded the degree of A. T.C.M.
