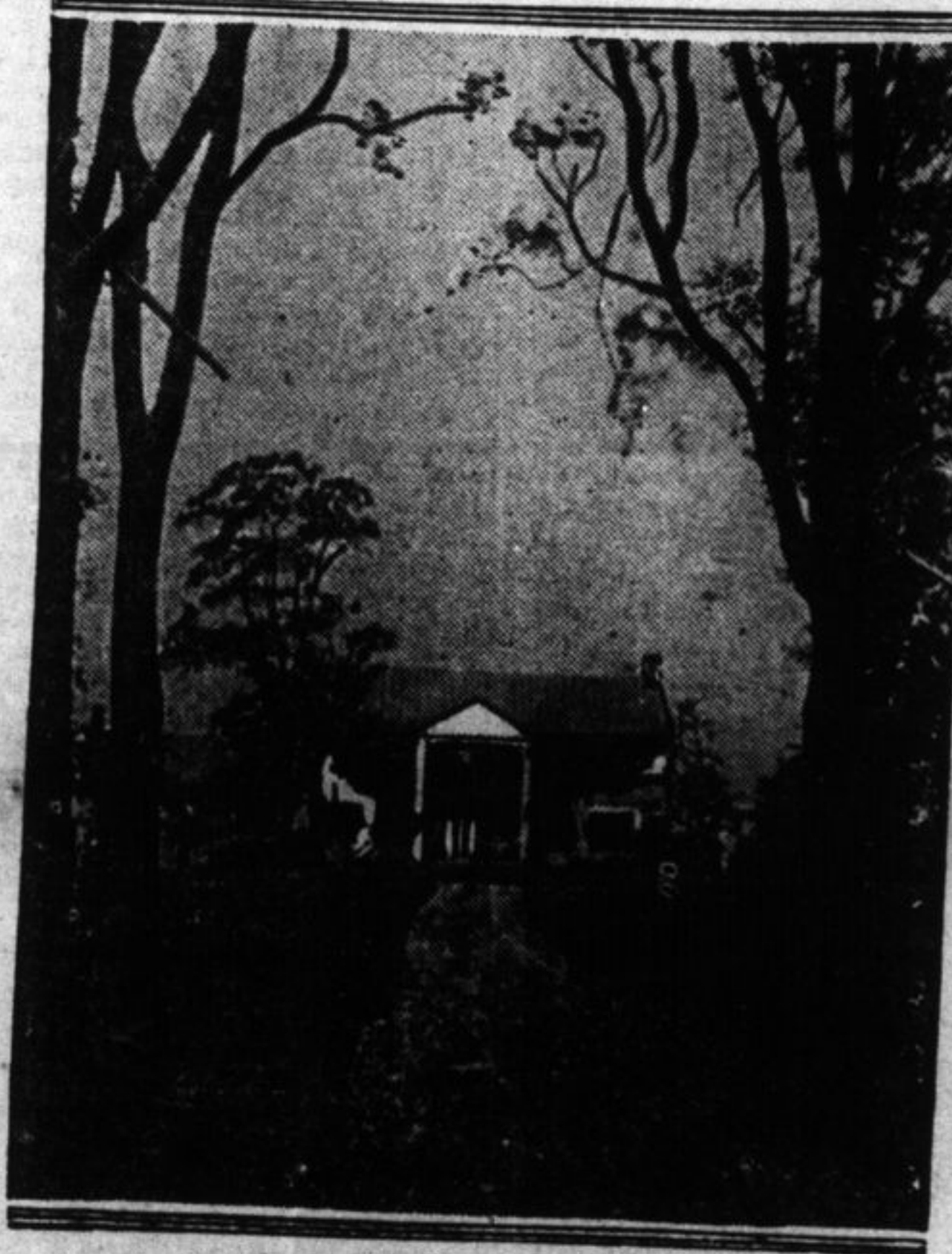
Had A Serious Fall.
