SPARKS' CIRCUS HERE AT THE FAIR GROUNDS

Street Parade Was Witnessed by Large Crowd, While the · Big Show Is Wonderful,

Tons of elephants—a batallion of clowns hordes of horses, riders, performers from every clime-polar bears-lions, tigers and other ingredients that go to make up a real circus-train loads of them-came to town Thursday morning for two performances of the Sparks Circus at the fair grounds. It is needless to say that many rusty alarm clocks came to life at daybreak for younger Kingston is having his cup of joy filled to overflowing today. The street parade eclipsed any seen here in recent years—all cages, tableaux wagons and trappings being resplendent in gold and silver trimmings, and by far the prettiest ever seen on the streets of our city. First in line was a monster gold bedecked wagon, followed by a section of men and women on gaily caparisoned thoroughbreds, after which came many cages and dens containing wild and ferocious beasts and ail in the pink of condition. Of course there were other bands and calliones galore-in fact all of the features that

go to make up this big Class A Cir-

The performance this afternoon opened with an oriental spectacle eminating from the King Tut period and is called "An Egyptian fantasy." In this spectacle several hundred human and animal participants occupy the three rings, stages and hippodrome track. A real soprano, Bessie Harvey, billed as the original "Prima-Donna of the White-tops" lives up to her title in a more than charming manner and the costuming is by far the most gorgeous ever here under a circus tent-in fact it is a big feature in itself. The spectacle is rapidly followed by a thrilling programme of skillfully executed circus acts unequalled in merit. First comes the wild animal offerings and they include Franz Woske's bengal tigers, Steve Batty's "Tarzan of the Apes" fighting lions. Madam Dorothy's leopards and a large group of polar bears with dogs intermingling fearlessly with the bears, all of these wild animal displays being given in a large protected steel arena; there are scores of educated ponies, dogs, pigs, seals, monkeys and even llamas-not overlooking two groups of monster elephants with lady trainers.

The purely circus features included dainty Naida Miller "the class and speed of the high-wire," the Flying Walters in aerial bar exploits, the Koban troupe of Japanese marvels, the Adele Nelson troupe of gymnasts and the Mardo Trio of exceptional acrobats and the Ballerina troupe of Spanish dancing and bareback riders. Never has there been seen such wonderful horse dis plays. Without a word of command from their trainer, Prof. Kloske, sixteen German thoroughbreds execute a series of drills and formations that are little short of marvellous and the same can be said of the other six horse liberty groups.

A round dozen fancy gaited animals held forth on the hippodrome track, the featured ones being Lady Fashion in an interpretation of the Argentine Tango and Baron De Bell, ridden by Florence Harris, world famed equestrienne star. In lieu of the perrenial chariot races, a large number of clever high and broad jumpers are introduced in the English fox-hunt which closed a splendid two hours' programme. Miss Harris caused many gasps of wonderment in this display with her English bred broad jumper, King George in a sensational thirty-foot jump. Clowns are an absolute essential to any circus and Sparks surely has them in qual'ty and quantity, their timely satires being button-bursters of the laughingest kind. Headed by the king laugh-maker Paul Wenzell, America's most widely copied clown, a young army of droll funmakers are on hand at all times during the performances. Another performance of this exceptional circus will be given tonight at 8, with the doors opening at 7, during which period a jazzy and classical programme will be rendered by the Jack Phillips Circus Band, augmented by Prof. J. M. Del Vecho, world's master pneumatic calliopist,

BELLEVILLE MASONS PRESENTED A GAVEL

To Moira Lodge at Gathering in Old London Attended by Col. W. N Ponton.

Belleville, Intelligencer. A Masonic gathering in Moira Lodge Old London on Thursday, July 17th, was of very special interest to the members of Moira Lodge, Belleville, W. M. Bro. Col. W. N. Ponton, Past Grand Master, was commisstoned by Moira Lodge Belleville, when he left for England in June, to carry greetings of the local lodge to Old Moira. Bro. Ponton took with him a beautiful gavel for presentation to the London Lodge on behalf of the Belleville brethren,

This gavel was made from a piece of iron wood procured from the old farm in Rawdon township on which V. W. Bro. George A. Kingston, first Ruling Master of Bay of Quinte Lodge, Toronto, was born. (This by kind permission of Alex, McInroy, the present owner of the farm). Bro. Kingston at the request of the local Moira Lodge, had it turned and carved in Toronto and beautifully silver mounted by Ellis Bros. with the following inscription:

"Moira Lodge No. 11, Belleville, greets Mother Moira, London, England, 1924."

Within the hollow handle of the gavel is fitted a parchment scroll on which was to be inscribed the historical setting of the presentation.
