ATTENDING GANANOQUE R.M.C. Graduates Must Serve Three Years in Militia

In accordance with amendments in the Regulations and Calendar of the Royal Military College, cadets, not appointed to permanent commissions on graduation, must obtain an appointment in a unit of the nonpermanent Active Militia and serve therein for at least three annual trainings. If residence in a foreign country makes this impossible, they must arrange to return for training, within a reasonable period, to the nearest convenient unit within the British Empire.
