THREE WEEKS IN JAIL FOLLOWED BY A FINE

Lot of Trouble for Fellow Who Drank Beer and Lemon Extract.

If you get under the influence of liquor and happen to get nabbed by the police in these days of the Ontario Temperance Act, there is trouble with a capital T. About three weeks ago a resident of the county was taken into custody on a charge of being intoxicated. He swore that he had been drinking extract of lemon and two percent beer, but the magistrate was not at all satisfied with his story and sent him to jail for three months, or until such time as he disclosed where he had secured his liquor. There were two more men in the party and one swore that they had secured liquor. The fellow sent to jail came before the magistrate again on Friday morning, and questioned by George Laturney, who appeared for him, he stated that he had been drinking extract of lemon and that he had secured the lemon from a local shopkeeper. LETTERS To The Editor

Opposes The O. T. A. Kingston, Aug. 8.—(To the Editor):—I appeal to the people to demand a sane temperance law. The O.T.A., supported by bootleggers and till lately ruthlessly enforced by gun play, is not a proper solution of the liquor question.

The O. T. A. is not a law of the Medes and Persians which cannot be changed. I respectfully ask the prohibitionists to answer the problems hereby submitted to them: 1. Prove that the Prohibition act known as the O. T. A. did not defeat the Hearst Government.

2. Prove that extravagance and the despicable tyrannical acts of the Roney-Sprachlin enforcement squad did not defeat the U. F. O. Government.

3. Prove that an unjust law has not a tendency to make people resist it but causes them to lose respect for all law and order. The O.T.A. has made liars, hypocrites and thieves of a lot of people.

4. Prove that while the Bible teaches Temperance in all things—condemns drunkenness as a fearful sin—it teaches prohibition.

5. Prove that the slogan "Banish the bar and save the boy" is a success, when the vast majority of the criminals in the United States and Canada are mere youths. Would it not do more to save the boys and girls to have more religion in the homes? Lessons in honor, purity, goodness and truth. Good literature, good company and clean sport? Would not this program faithfully and prayerfully carried out lessen the number of candidates for prison?

6. Prove that prohibition prohibits when there is less drunkenness in Roman Catholic Quebec under government control than in Protestant Ontario with its O.T.A. The deadly home-brew and bootlegging products are responsible for a lot of drunkenness.

7. Prove that the O.T.A. is not a wretched piece of class legislation. The rich man has his cellar stocked with all kinds of liquor while the poor working man has to be satisfied with his two per cent. The working men's petition for a more palatable beer was met by their prompt refusal. The working men used their ballots when the chance came to overthrow the modern Pharisees in Queen's Park, Toronto. They will now vote to replace the crank prohibition law, misnamed "the O.T.A.," by a sane temperance law.

8. Prove that the framers of this infamous O.T.A. did not see its injustice when in order to enforce it they trampled under foot a principle of British Laws.

9. The murdered, adulterer, burglar, hold-up man and swindler are innocent in the eyes of the laws till tried and brought in by the jury before the judge in open court. The person charged with a breach of this O.T.A. is guilty and has to prove his innocence before a magistrate oftentimes endowed with little knowledge of law. There was not, till lately, a chance to appeal from the decisions of this infallible magistrate to a higher court.

10. Prove that it is not a sin against charity to denounce all who fail to see the supposed benefits of the O.T.A. A lot of men and women voted for the O.T.A. in order to give it a chance to make good. They will now vote for it to be replaced by a sane temperance act.

The prohibition leaders know this and there is no doubt this is the reason for their frantic efforts against the plebiscite in October. They know what the people in other provinces did with the so-called prohibition acts. They are afraid of the defeat of their ferocious O.T.A.

People should demand a sane temperance law. A law which will drive the bootlegger one of business; a law which will not make the members of an honorable profession bar keepers; a law which will allow the proper use of liquor to reasonable and responsible people. A sane temperance law, backed by an overwhelming majority of the people, can be respected and enforced by the regular officers of the law.

The Dominion skippers obtained more points toward the cups offered in the two feature classes—those for the "P" and "R" class boats—and also continued their victories in the smaller ratings.
