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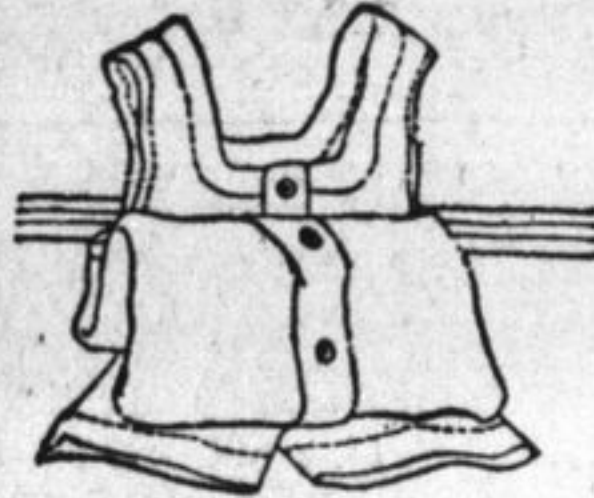

WITH THE STUDENTS

Address by Prof. Jackson on New Zealand—Results of Tennis Games.

It was indeed a splendid evening which was arranged for the students of Queen's Summer School on Friday. At eight o'clock Professor Vincent W. Jackson, of the University of Manitoba, gave a splendid lecture on "New Zealand" going into the scenery, geological structure, plant and animal life, agricultural methods and possibilities and form of government. With his lecture he presented a splendid collection of colored illustrations.

Professor Jackson spent several years in New Zealand on elementary agricultural education for the government and in the course of his tours through the small island nation so far away became well acquainted with its many points and its people. He gave descriptions, with illustrations, of the aborigines of the island, the Maoris, and with beautiful pictures of the kauri pine showed the vast timber resources available.

New Zealand is known as the "Kindergarten of Socialistic Legislation." Almost every known form of socialistic government has been tried out there, and Professor Jackson told the large audience just why, largely due to its insular position, New Zealand can carry out such a form of government where other nations fail.

Splendid pictures of plant and animal life and of work at the various industries were also shown. The large philosophy room was filled to capacity and the splendid lecture highly appreciated by all who heard it.

Tennis of high quality was seen on the Queen's courts Friday afternoon when the finals of the men's and ladies' singles and the ladies' doubles were played off.

The men's singles were won by G. B. Sexton, of Strathroy, who defeated J. A. McLean, of Paisley, 6-4, 10-8, after a tense finish.

Miss Mabel Simpson, who has led Queen's girls in past years in this game, won the ladies' singles, defeating Miss Beryl Truax, 6-4, 8-6. Both players are from Montreal.

In the ladies' doubles, Miss Aida Crewson, Alexandria, and Miss Alice Smith, Owen Sound, won from Miss E. Stuart, Osgoode Station, and Miss A. M. Rudolph, Lunenburg, N.S., 6-2, 6-2.

The games were watched by a large crowd of students and members of the staff. The referees included J. M. Ewing in the men's singles, C. F. Cannon in the ladies' singles, and P. A. Boyce in the ladies' doubles.

The finals of the men's doubles will be played next week. Saturday afternoon has been set for the opening of the series of matches between the Queen's students and the Kingston Tennis Club.

The conference of the provincial representatives, with A. H. Carr has been postponed till Monday. The committee canvassing for the Women's Residence Fund also meets on Monday.

The softball baseball finals will be played on Monday between the East and Toronto. A game between the married and single men is being announced for Tuesday.

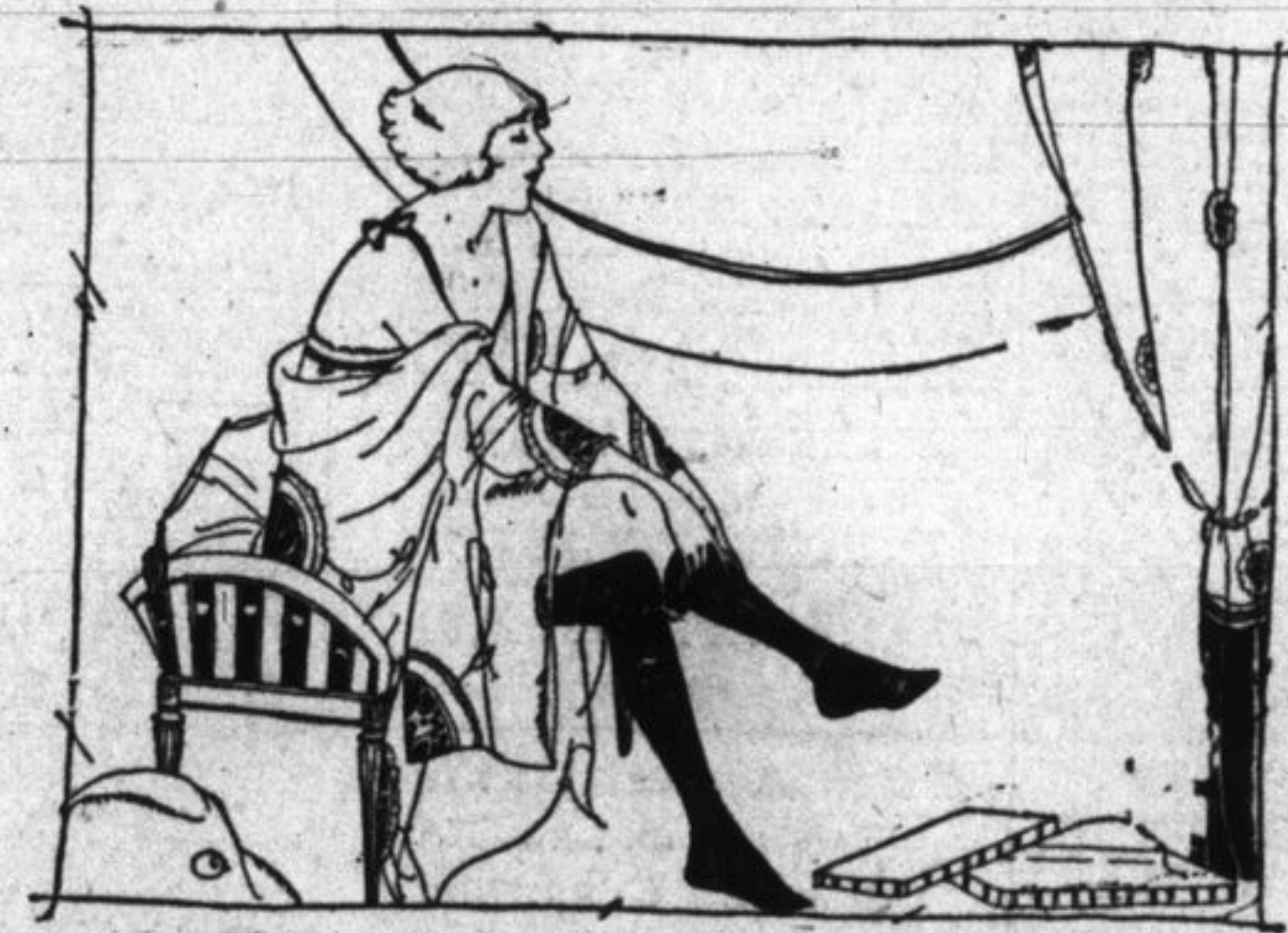
