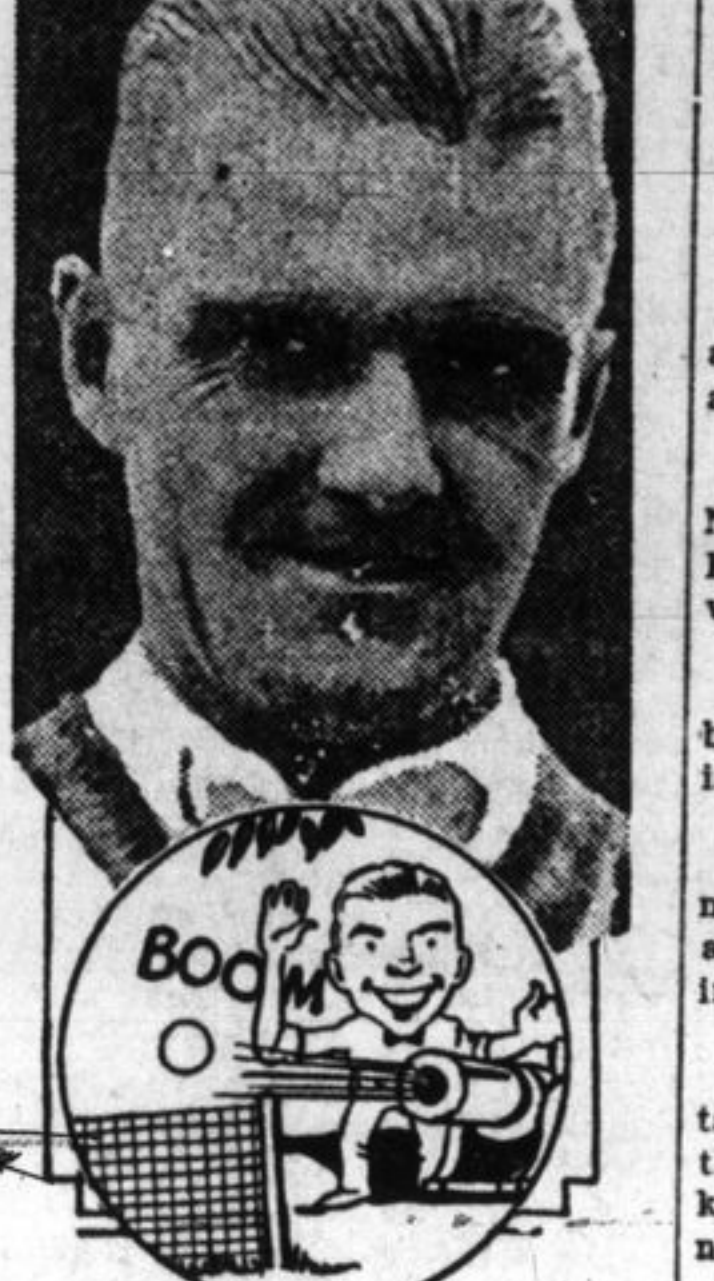

The More of Your Folks Can Drive It, The Handier A Car Will Be

IT IS TOO BAD to have a motor car in the garage and no one to drive it—a condition which too often arises when but one of the family holds an operator's license and that one is ill or away. Sooner or later practically every person of legal age and not incapacitated is going to learn to drive and the sooner they do so the better so far as obtaining the maximum benefit from car ownership is concerned.

TRANSMISSION BEARINGS MAY BE WORN

L. A. writes: My car has a noisy transmission. When I have it in second gear, it sounds more like a truck than a touring car. Can anything be done to remedy this?

Answer: We wonder if this transmission has ever been run with insufficient lubrication. If it has, some of its bearings may have become worn, which would account for its noisy operation. The lubricant should always be 4 1/2 inches deep, as measured with a stick inserted through the filler hole. The bearing most likely to have become worn is the bronze bushing in the end of the clutch shaft, in which the forward end of the sliding-gear shaft runs. If this has worn badly, you can detect it by uncovering the transmission and prying between the second speed gear and the countershaft. It is hardly likely that any other bearings are badly worn, but it will be well to test them all. It is quite a job to replace any of these bearings, but if you find it necessary, you can have it done, with a minimum of delay, the next time that the car is in the shop for general repairs.

We assume that you are using a heavy transmission lubricant, but one that is still somewhat fluid.

PREVENTING AXLE OVER-LUBRICATION

C. Y. asks: How can grease be prevented from working out from the rear-axle housing of a car onto the brake linings and the wheels?

Answer: By keeping the level of the lubricant down to the plugged opening near the bottom of the gear housing and by using lubricant of a suitable consistency, preferably that recommended and supplied by the manufacturer of this car, for this purpose. Just inside each of the outboard axle-shaft bearings are three felt washers on the shafts and these have to be renewed occasionally or oil will leak past them. The wheels and bearings have to be removed to do this. There is another felt washer, just inside each wheel, and this can be renewed by removing the wheel only. If you take out the shafts, it will be well to wipe them clean of oil before replacing them. You can get these felt washers at your service station, and it is not a difficult job to install them, but care should be taken as to bearing readjustments and their secure locking.
