THE DEADLY PARALLEL

On Tuesday the Standard, under the above caption, reprinted excerpts from recent addresses by Premier King and Sir Henry Thornton, seeking to show that a reduction in the duty on certain agricultural, mining and fishing goods was the very ruination of the country. When one realizes that agricultural implement manufacturers have been enabled to reduce prices to the farmers and increase their output, the absurdity of the Standard's argument becomes plainly apparent.

However, since our contemporary has introduced the "deadly parallel," it might be worth while noting another one. On Tuesday, Aug. 19th, in column 4, page 12, of the Princess street paper, appears the following articles:

To-day's Market.

There was a fairly large market this morning and busy buyers were not long in gathering up their needed supplies. There was an abundance of raspberries on hand which sold at 25c and 30c a box. Potatoes sold at 25c a peck, while corn was plentiful, selling at 25c and 35c a dozen. Chickens sold at \$1.25 and \$2.25 a pair and fowl brought \$1.50 a pair. Cucumbers sold for 5c each.

Small Market.

There was a small market to-day, and the prices of produce showed very little change from last Saturday. Tomatoes seemed to be more plentiful and sold cheaper than usual.

FOUR BANDITS MAKE GREAT DIAMOND HAUL

Hold Up Clerks in Boston Store and Got Away With \$150,000 Worth.

Boston, Aug. 20.—Diamonds and jewelry valued at about one hundred and fifty thousand dollars were stolen by four men who held up the clerks in the store of Carl Skinner, diamond merchants here today. One bandit remained in an automobile, two covered three clerks with revolvers, while the fourth picked up the jewelry which had been removed from the safe shortly after the store opened. They all escaped in the automobile. The clerks stated that the real loss might prove much greater than \$150,000. The jewelry included diamond bracelets and brooches and platinum goods.

BANDIT "SQUEALED" SHOT BY HIS LEADER

Working With Sheriffs to Frustrate Hold-Up and Was Suspected.

Tolt, Wash., Aug. 20.—A bandit, Ted Lawshe, turned traitor to his criminal associates on the eve of the robbery of the Snoqualmie state bank last Wednesday, informed the sheriff, Matt Starwich, and retained his position in the bandit lineup at the sheriff's request, it developed at an inquest yesterday.

When the bandit trio took their positions in front of the teller's window at the bank, the sheriff and his deputies arose from behind the counter. An exchange of shots between the officers and the bandit leader, D. C. Malone, followed, in which Malone was killed.

Before he dropped though, Malone, in the last moment, apparently suspected Lawshe and shot him to death, testimony showed. The sheriff testified that Lawshe was introduced to deputy sheriffs the day before the hold-up attempt so that his deputies would not mistake him. A third bandit is in jail.

Iroquois Girl Injured When Auto Turned Turtle

Iroquois, Aug. 20.—Miss Dorothy Marcellus, aged twenty, of Iroquois, sustained a broken collarbone and a severe shaking up yesterday afternoon, when the sedan motor car in which she was a passenger got beyond control on the provincial highway, half a mile east of the village, and turned turtle in the ditch. Her companion, Miss Marie Fleck, Georgetown, who was driving the car escaped with slight injuries. The car was very badly damaged.

Dustin Farnum Granted Divorce.

Reno, Nev., Aug. 20.—Charging desertion, Dustin Farnum, screen star, was granted a decree of divorce in the district court here yesterday from May Elizabeth Farnum, to whom he was married in November, 1904, at Chicago.
