

Add three ounces of flour of emery and enough lamp black to color. Stir till smooth and then apply the mixture to the board with the end of a roll of woollen goods. You will have to give the board three coats of this for best results. Any firstrate hardware store can sell you the flour-of-emery and the lamp black and glue. Keep up the good work of economy!
