### NEW CHIEF JUSTICE NAMED IN ALBERTA

Hon. Horace Harvey is Appointed—Hon. J. R. Boyle Receives Judgeship.

Ottawa, Aug. 29.—Appointments to the supreme court of Alberta consequent on the death of Chief Justice D. L. Scott were announced here Wednesday. Hon. Horace Harvey, chief justice of the trial division of the supreme court, becomes chief justice of Alberta and president of the appellate division of the supreme court.

Hon. William Charles Simmons, judge of the trial division, is elevated to the chief justiceship of that division and becomes ex-officio a judge of the appellate division of the supreme court.

The vacancy on the trial division is filled by the appointment of Hon. John R. Boyle, K.C., Edmonton, who succeeded Hon. Charles Stewart, now minister of the interior in the federal government, as leader of the opposition in the Alberta legislature. Mr. Boyle is appointed a judge of the trial division and ex-officio a judge of the appellate division of the supreme court.

### FERRY BOAT BREAKS DOWN.

Passengers and Autos Delayed Enroute to Clayton.

Clayton, N.Y., Aug. 29.—The steamer Yennek of the Gananogue-Clayton ferry line broke down on the noon trip from Gananogue to Clayton on Wednesday, and was obliged to drop anchor off the foot of Picton island, and dispatch a small boat to Clayton for a mechanic. The boat came into Clayton under her own power about 6 p.m. In the meantime a motor boat from Grindstone island brought the Yennek's passengers numbering about twenty-five to Clayton.

The ferry also had four automobiles on board, and as many of the passengers were motoring home they were detained all afternoon awaiting the arrival of the boat with their cars. Late in the afternoon a severe storm came up, and the boat was pounded around in the waves but was undamaged.

Characterized as always by artistic skill and educational value, the Canadian Pacific display this year promises to elicit more than ordinary approval. Illuminated models of the cruise of the Express of France around the world, leaving New York January 14th, 1925, and the Express of Scotland to the Mediterranean occupy prominent space, the indirect, varicolored lighting from the ceiling harmonizing with the dimming of the lights in the models making a most realistic impression of day and night. A huge revolving globe map of the world in the centre with the routes of the trains and steamships of the company impresses the visitor with the right of the company to its motto "Spans the World."

But the attention of the visitor is mainly held by the Northern Ontario hunting scene with its miniature waterfall, river, moose and deer moving before one's eyes and with all the equipment used by the hunter including tent, camp stencils, etc., in the foreground.
