A full sized model of a huge Canadian Pacific engine apparently coming through the wall of the building with whistle blowing, bell ringing and a sound of movement made by compressed air together with a hunting scene with a painted background of 16 by 60 feet so realistic as to make the visitor to the Canadian Pacific display in the Railway Building at the Canadian National Exhibition, immediately consider a trip into Northern Ontario, are a few of the features that greet one on entering the building. Characterized as always by artistic skill and educational value, the Canadian Pacific display this year promises to elicit more than ordinary approval. No expense has been spared to make the display an attractive one. Illuminated models of the cruise of the Express of France around the world, leaving New York January 14th, 1925, and the Empress of Scotland to the Mediterranean occupy prominent space, the indirect varicolored lighting from the ceiling harmonizing with the dimming of the lights in the models making a most realistic impression of day and night. A huge revolving globe map of the world in the centre with the routes of the trains and steamships of the company impresses the visitor with the right of the company to its motto "Spans the World." But the attention of the visitor is mainly held by the Northern Ontario hunting scene with its miniature waterfall, river, moose and deer moving before one's eyes and with all the equipment used by the hunter including tent, camp utensils, etc., in the foreground. In all, the Canadian Pacific display this year is one that thoroughly convinces the Exhibition visitor of the vast size of the company, the success of which has been built upon a continual high standard of service to the public.
