#### SHORT SYNOPSIS OF WHIRLWIND COMEDY.

"The First Year" Comes to Grand

#### SATURDAY'S MARKET.

Was the Largest of the Year—  
Loads of Produce.

Kingston has little need of fairs and exhibitions while such markets as that on the square Saturday morning are to be seen. It was the largest turnout of 1924, with the vehicles of vendors taking up every available bit of space on Brock street, throughout the square, skirting the offices of the "vender" to Ontario street, and completely filling the block of Market street from Ontario to King. Every car and wagon was loaded with produce. Woven baskets, home-made furniture, special "medicines" and collie puppies were some of the novelty lines offered.

Tomatoes in bulk were sold at \$1 a bushel; apples brought 35c to 60c a peck; potatoes were 25c a peck; eggs stayed around 35c a dozen and butter at 38c and 40c a pound; cut flowers were in prominence as usual and busy housewives prepared for extensive pickling with gherkins, pickling onions, peppers, etc.

At eleven o'clock there were 131 cars belonging to farmers and market gardeners parked on the square in addition to the large number of "covered wagons" and other horse-drawn vehicles.

### LIQUOR SMUGGLING ON LAKE ONTARIO

A Rochester, N.Y., Reporter Writes of Big Craft That Operates Nightly.

Rochester, N.Y., Aug. 30.—Further revelations of rum-running on a large scale along Lake Ontario shores was contained today in a copyrighted story printed by the Rochester Journal and Post Express. According to the story, a reporter for the newspaper boarded a large liquor-running craft last night between Putneyville and Sodus Bay, witnessing the activities of the smaller rum craft that came out for their cargoes. From the captain, says the story, the reporter learned that he pays nightly visits to the New York shore from Canada, always landing a full cargo of ale and whiskey. "Sure we make trips every night," the captain is quoted as saying, "except when it is too rough or when the boat's engines give trouble."

"It won't do the customs authorities any good to look for us," he continued, "for we are here one night and another place the next. We have managed to elude them every time. In fact, we have only been seen once what we believed to have been a customs boat. We expect to continue operations until the lake freezes."

The reporter declared the boat was equipped with a large searchlight and engines capable of making 30 knots an hour. It had no name. Examinations at Queen's. ### ANCIENT CANNON PARADE.

Viewed on the Streets of Perth—Impressive Curious. Bystander in Toronto Globe writes: When a couple of brass cannon were seen moving through the streets of Perth the other day a stranger was startled into momentary belief that another mobilization had begun, and that this quiet Eastern Ontario town was among the first to respond to the call. A closer examination showed there was no cause for alarm, as the armament was not up to date, was, in fact, quite antiquated and a mere decoration in front of the Court House. They had been undergoing renovation by having their wheels replaced, the old ones having worn out in service in their role of ornament.

As they stood, the cannon were impressive as curios, though their barrels, of three-inch bore and about three feet in length, showed they belonged to an early period. They were, according to local information, manufactured in Belgium about 1750, were soon captured by the French, and later on were recaptured by the then Duke of York from the French in Flanders, during one of the many engagements about the time Canada was taken.

They formed part of the army sent out to subdue the rebellious Thirteen Colonies of America, and were used throughout the Revolutionary War until captured by the Americans when General Burgoyne surrendered at Saratoga. They were then used by the Americans, and subsequently, in the War of 1812-15, being part of the outfit of the American forces at Chrysler's Farm, were taken by the British forces. The late John Cox, Sergeant in the 19th Light Dragoons, and grandfather of Mr. Alex. Kippen, now a veteran resident of Perth, took a prominent part in the capture of the two guns, which later on were presented to the Town of Perth, and have remained there an interesting link of the past. Chrysler's Farm battlefield lies about 50 miles east of Perth, on the edge of the St. Lawrence River.

### The Finest Turquois.

A turquois, regarded by collectors as the largest and most perfect in the world, has recently been presented to the Field Museum in Chicago by Hohannes Topakyan, grand vizier of Persia and former consul-general to the United States. The stone, which weighs about 400 karats, was an heirloom in the family of the grand vizier. Its history crosses the lives of shahs and boys for generations.
