WRIGHT'S MACHINE SHOP

IN FINE NEW LOCATION

Old Established Business Has Moved from Princess to Ontario Street

Wright's Machine shop, formerly located at 40 Princess street, has recently been moved into its new building at 224-226 Ontario street, around the corner from Brock street and just opposite the Lower Fire Station. The new name of the firm is George A. Wright & Son, the latter, Albert Wright, having just been taken into the business with his father.

George Wright has been one of Kingston's best-known machine experts for a quarter of a century. He learned his trade with the J. F. McEwen Foundry and for over twenty-five years has been in business for himself, operating as the machine shop branch of Angrove's Foundry and with other foundries and later moving to 40 Princess street. The quarters there were found to be inadequate for a fast-growing trade and the new structure became necessary. It is a brick building of two floors with lofty ceilings and bright airy surroundings. The machinery, lathes, planer, mills, drills—is up-to-date and the very best that money can buy and the work turned out speaks for itself.

Everything in machine work is handled. General repairs, new parts, oxy-acetylene welding, gear cutting, marine repairs of all kinds and nothing too large or too small. On overhead track with chain blocks provides for the handling of heavy jobs. The back section of the ground floor is of concrete and the front half, with an extensive collar below, of heavy hardwood. It is a clean, healthful and attractive building which has done much to brighten up that section of Ontario street.
