Against Constable Dowsley Over Collision on Road.

Frederick Patterson, a farmer on the provincial highway thirteen miles east of Kingston, visited the Whig office Wednesday morning with Justice of the Peace Allison, of Wolfe Island and denied some of the statements printed in Tuesday's Whig concerning the accident to Traffic Constable Percy Dowsley on Saturday night last. The Whig's account was written from Constable Dowsley's own story.

Mr. Patterson, who, with his wife and child, occupied the buggy hit by the constable, said that his wife was badly hurt and is still confined to her home, attended by Dr. Sinclair of Gananoque. She sustained cuts about the limbs and body. Mr. Patterson further states that he did not see any cars near him or passing him at the time of the accident and that no car passed him from the opposite direction until five minutes after it happened.

It is intimated that he will institute an action against Constable Dowsley as soon as the latter is able to be about again.
