Frederick Patterson, a farmer o the provincial highway thirteen miles east of Kingston, visited the Whig office Wednesday morning with Justice of the Peace Allinson of Wolfe Island and denied some of the statements printed in Tuesday' Whig concerning the accident Traffic Constable Percy Dowsley on Saturday night last. 
