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WHAT PLANETS DECREE FOR PRINCE OF WALES

Astrologist Says H.R.H. Will Marry a Fair Daughter of Buccleuch.

It might have been different had Venus been wandering somewhere between Oshkosh and Schenectady, U.S.A., on that particular night. But it so happens that when the doctor smiled at George Witten, otherwise known as King George, and said, "It's a boy!" the fickle planet that watches over romance was glowing softly down on a certain part of Scotland. And that settles it! You may dance with the prince and catch a flirtatious note in his eye, but when the heir to Britain's throne slips the gold band ring on

the wedding finger, the party of the second part will be a Scottish maiden—probably one of those pretty Buccleuch gals.

And this will happen about 1928—four long years—when the planets will be talking with a broad Scotch burr, but the prince will hear these sweet nothings despite the Harry Lauder accent and will tumble far worse than ever he did from a horse.

All this is prognosticated by Miss Belle Bart, director of the American Academy of Astrology, who has been watching the heavens closely in the interest of the glorified American girl who thinks she can cop off the visiting peer.

Miss Bart has charted the skies to read the future of the Prince of Wales. Some things, she says, may not now be told because they have too personal and important a bearing.

But of major importance, both to the prince and to future history, is the prognostication that the Prince of Wales may ascend the throne of England in 1925.

Miss Bart does not predict the death of the present king, but says the prince will be plunged into some sort of trouble early next spring, and then will begin a turn of events that may enable him to assume the British throne if he so desires.

The exact horoscopic vernacular is this:

Information received from Oswego, N.Y., states that no word had been received from David Tugwell and Harry Sheldon, who left there in their yacht for Amherst Island two weeks ago last Friday, and all hope for their safety has been abandoned.

Mr. Sheldon's father, William L. Sheldon, left Oswego, Monday, in a motor launch accompanied by a skilled yachtsman, who claimed to have seen a boat two weeks ago last Sunday near Chaumont, and evidently in distress. He said that there was a heavy sea rolling at the time, and he had all he could do to master his own boat. Mr. Sheldon was equipped with a pair of powerful marine glasses with which he was to sweep the shore looking for the wreckage.

POLICE COURT SESSION SHORT AND SNAPPY

A Prisoner Walked In, Turned Around and Walked Out Again.

One of the shortest sessions on record of the Kingston police court was held on Thursday morning. The session lasted two seconds, or just time enough for Magistrate Farrell to say "Ten dollars and costs."
