

Never were the homes of the laboring class in Ontario so happy and comfortable as today. They should help the weaker ones to resist this insidious foe. Quebec's four million dollars revenue this year chiefly came out of the homes of the working people. It was an appalling way to conserve the best interests of toiling masses, the preacher claimed.
