In Western University

Edmund MacDonald, 73 Pembroke street, who graduated at Queen's in arts this spring, has been appointed lecturer in economics at Western University, London, Ont. His acceptance of this post means the relinquishment of a philosophy fellowship, valued at \$400, which he won at Queen's last spring. Mr. MacDonald will leave for London on Tuesday.

The London university staff includes two other Queen's men, Arthur Woods, M.A., Queen's, 1914, who is assistant professor of mathematics, and A. G. Dorland, formerly of the Queen's history staff, who is head of the department of history at Western.

### BARBARA LA MARR IN "THE WHITE MOTH"

"The White Moth," a story of the French Theatre, co-featuring Barbara La Marr and Conway Tearle, will be the first National picture at the Capitol Theatre this week, beginning Monday.

### LETTERS To The Editor

#### Principal Sliter's Explanation.

Kingston, Sept. 8.—(To the Editor): In spite of any statements to the contrary, there is only one reason why the matriculation results have not been published from the Collegiate Institute, and this is that the large number of candidates—203 in the middle school and 71 in the upper school—makes the publication in detail too big an undertaking.

For this reason there has been no publication with names since the new scheme of matriculation was adopted by the department of education. As soon as it has been submitted to the board, an analysis of the results will be published, as was done last year, showing the number of candidates, the number of papers written on, the number passed, the honors obtained, etc.—which, by the way, is the only method of publication which gives any idea how a school has fared as a whole.
